STANLEY'S WAY.

Explorer's Confession of Faith Was to Do the Work to Which He Had Set His Hand.

Writing of the late Sir Henry M. Stanley, in "The Cornhill Magazine," Mr. Sidney Low says:

I remember once asking him what he would have done if he had been in Emin Pasha's place on that last fatal day when the emissaries of the slavers came into his tent. "I should not have allowed myself to be slaughtered like that," said Stanley; "I should have thought it all out beforehand, and I think I should have meant very well what the ruffians meant the moment I set eyes upon them. I might have been killed, but not," he added, grimly, "by those men, for I should have killed them first."

Similarly he spoke of Gordon's end. "If," he said, "I had been sent to get the Khartoum garrison away, I should have thought of that and nothing else; I should have calculated the chances, made out exactly what resistance I would have to encounter, and how it could be overcome, and laid all my plans with the single object of accomplishing my purpose." I believe, though he did not say so, that he thought the retreat could have been effected, or the town held, till the relief column arrived, if proper measures had been taken and the one definite aim had been kept steadily in view all the time. That was his own principle of action. When he had an object to fulfill, a commission to carry out, he could think of nothing else till the work was done. Difficulties, toil, hardships, sacrifices of all kinds, of time, of men, of money, were only incidents in the journey that led to a goal, to be reached if human endeavor could gain it. "No honor," he wrote, "no reward, however great, can be equal to the subtle satisfaction that a man feels when he can point to his work and say: 'See, now, the task I promised you to perform with all loyalty and honesty, with might and main, to the utmost of my ability is to-day finished.'"

This was the prime article in Stanley's confession of faith—to do the work to which he had set his hand, and in doing it, like Tennyson's Ulysses:

To strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield.

Unique Relic of 1776.

In the fall of 1899 a boy named Charles Cooper was trying to dig out a rabbit on the property of Mr. E. D. Smith, near Winona, about a mile east of what is known as McNally Mountain. Scarcely more than a foot from the surface he turned up a piece of a large shell, whole specimens of which are sometimes found in Ontario Indian graves although the habitat of such specimens is the coast of Florida. On this bit of shell there was a little rough engraving done, evidently by the hand of an Indian. Close to the shell he found what is, in some respects, an extremely interesting example of carving on stone. The material (lithographic limestone) is six and a half inches high, seven and a half wide, and averages an inch and a half in thickness. Mr. W. S. Allward is authority for the statement that the carving is by no means artistic, taking all things into account. The date (1776) affords no clue as to the origin or purpose of this little monument, which may have been lovingly executed to mark the last resting place of the artist's friend, or it may have been the work of an early surveyor during some idle hours in the woods, or—but why need we guess? Mr. Edgar Farewell of Grimsby, purchased Charlie Cooper's find, and by him the stone-carving was presented to Mr. Boyle for the Provincial Museum.

Italy's King As a Fisherman.

The King of Italy is very fond of fishing, but it is the one sport at which he has no luck. One day he was out for several hours and was returning homeward with a keeper, on foot, with three poor fish on a string, when they met a poor man with a magnificent catch of trout. The peasant planted himself before the King and asked for a light for his pipe, and when he had received it, said with scorn:

"You seem to be no great things with regard to fishing. To look at your catch, I should say you were the King."

His Majesty, rather red in the face, asked why.

"Oh," returned the other, "he thinks very much of himself, but he is a poor body, more fit to be a King than a sportsman!"

A Census of the Jews.

According to a rough census made by Professor Haman, of Switzerland, there are 19,000,000 Jews in the world. Of these it is figured that the United States has 1,000,000; Europe 10,000,000 and countries outside of Europe 8,000,000. Professor Haman gives this distribution of the Jews in Europe: Russia, 5,000,000; Austria-Hungary, 1,800,000; Germany, 568,000; Roumania, 300,000; Great Britain, 200,000; Turkey, 120,000; Holland, 97,000; France, 77,000; Italy, 50,000; Servia, 5,000; Switzerland, 12,000; Denmark, 4,000; Belgium, 3,000; Spain, 2,500, and Portugal, only 300.

Deep Mining.

Great advance in deep level mining is the result of the advance in engineering science. Some years ago three thousand feet was considered a great depth, but this limit has been much exceeded. At Flenu, Belgium, thirty-five hundred feet has been reached, while at Calumet, Mecla and Tanarouch, in the United States, mines from forty-five hundred to fifty-four hundred feet have been worked. The temperature is the great thing to overcome.
