MR. BORDEN ON DIVORCE

Suggests Joint Committee For Trial Court For Divorces.

Likewise Thinks an Officer Corresponding to the "King's Proctor" Should Intervene in Uncontested Cases—Col. Tisdale Thinks It Unfortunate That We Have Not a Divorce Court.

Ottawa, June 19.—In the House yesterday afternoon Mr. Northrup (East Hastings), moved that the Macintosh divorce bill be referred back to the committee on private bills. Fifty members of that committee were absent when the Senate bill was rejected by a vote of 18 to 13. The Minister of Justice had voted with the minority. He submitted that the matter should receive more careful consideration.

Mr. Lancaster (Lincoln and Niagara) opposed the motion.

Wants a Divorce Court.

Col. Tisdale (Norfolk) thought the defendant was entitled to a vote of the full committee. Six other members were in session at the time. He thought it unfortunate that we had not a divorce court to consider these cases.

Mr. Derbyshire (Brockville) also supported the motion.

There was very careful and judicious in dealing with these cases. Mr. Henderson (Halton) felt that in this case there had been a serious miscarriage of justice.

Mr. Aylesworth (South York) opposed the motion.

Mr. Aylesworth stated that he had carefully read the evidence in the case. It was one of the plainest cases that he had ever seen. It was unfortunate that some members were called to attend other committees.

He was hurried through and the Speaker had no opportunity to be heard. While, as a rule, the House should sustain the judgment of a committee, yet he thought this case was an exception.

Friends of the respondent were in consultation with members of the committee, and it certainly appeared as though some of the committee did not fully realize that they were acting in a judicial capacity.

The bill goes back to committee.

The Peer Divorce.

Another divorce case that occupied the House was letter G. of the Senate, entitled, "An act for the relief of John Albert Peer." The parties had been married and lived happily for twenty years. They had four children. Mr. Lancaster urged the House not to agree with the report of the Senate. The defendant had offered no evidence, but she had filed an affidavit stating that she had no means to make a defence. Divorces were increasing too rapidly. From 1874 to 1884 Canada granted nine divorces. In the one session of 1905 there were ten divorces, and at this session twenty cases had come from the Senate.

Mr. Aylesworth reviewed the testimony. The respondent had left her husband and lived with her husband's cousin in London. Since then a child was born and registered by the woman as the cousin's child.

Mr. Borden's Idea.

R. L. Borden feared that all divorce cases were not heard and decided judicially. Lobbying was always objectionable, but in divorce cases it was especially odious. He suggested that the trial court for divorces be a joint committee of both Houses. He thought that some officer corresponding to the "King's Proctor" should intervene in uncontested cases so as to guard against collusion and to protect the public interest. So far as the pending bill was concerned he thought that the case was fully proved.

The bill passed.

Before the orders of the day, Mr. Boyce (West Algoma) called attention to the defalcation of a certain Mr. McLean, who had embezzled some four thousand dollars of the pension funds for widows and orphans of pilots at Niagara. Nova Scotia.

The Premier promised attention.

Col. Hughes "Too Previous."

Col. Sam Hughes enquired if there was any foundation for the newspaper statement that Mr. Aylesworth was about to resign.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier smilingly said that his hon. friend was "too previous."

Mr. Foster (North Toronto) called attention to the statement of C. J. C. M. in the House of Commons regarding the alleged anti-Catholic utterances in the recent London bye-election and entered a sweeping denial of the same.

Q. T. P. Subsidiary Companies.

The bill to incorporate the Grand Trunk Pacific Branch Lines Co. occupied the attention of the House this afternoon. It was objected that the Grand Trunk Pacific should build its own branches instead of incorporating a separate company.

Mr. Emmerson said that there was no new principle involved in the bill. Subsidiary companies had been repeatedly chartered for the C. P. R.

Mr. Fringle (Cornwall and Stormont) pointed out that the G. T. P., when incorporated, was to open up a new country. The branches provided for by this bill were really closely parallel branches and would closely parallel branches these branches would run side by side with the C. P. R.

A Promise Violated.

In committing the enterprise to the Grand Trunk Pacific the Premier, Mr. Fielding and others that it was not to come nearer than thirty miles to existing roads except at principal points. It was to be a "colonization line."

Mr. Emmerson replied that the policy of the Government had always been to place railway companies to build branches when and where they pleased. The fact that such branches paralleled other roads was, in his opinion, immaterial.

A railroad only benefited the country for about six miles on either side. The western people were demanding more roads and he would do nothing to prevent that demand being satisfied.

Any companies were prepared to meet it.

Oliver Jan's Telling.

In the House last night the Opposition pressed Mr. Oliver for some answer as to whether he intended to discontinue Mr. Frost's bill. They were unable, however, to elicit any definite reply. He intimated that he might make a trip this summer to investigate at closer range. He was not satisfied with the conditions prevailing at our offices in England, but he was not prepared at present to say just what ought to be done.

Right to Regulate Questioned.

Ottawa, June 19.—The special committee to consider the proposed amendments to the Railway Act so as to include express and telephone companies under the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission met yesterday morning and considered the bill introduced by Mr. Oliver (Prince Edward) to regulate express companies. F. H. Chrysler appeared for the C. P. R. and M. K. Cowan for the G. T. P.

Mr. Chrysler disputed the power of Parliament to regulate the tolls to be charged by express companies.

Because a Parliament had the right to incorporate companies it did not necessarily follow that it had the right to regulate them, too. The British North America Act left the control of property and civil rights to the provinces, and in his judgment, a transaction between an express company and its customer was a civil contract. Therefore, the business of express rates and business belonged to the provinces.

Mr. Chrysler held that an express company was not an undertaking under the meaning of the B. N. A. Act.

W. F. Maclean (South York) insisted that Parliament had such power under the provisions of the B. N. A. Act granting jurisdiction to the Dominion Government over trade and commerce. The United States Congress had regulated the express companies under a constitutional grant to regulate commerce between the states.

Mr. Monk held that Parliament's full authority to regulate trade and commerce gave it the right to regulate express companies.

Sir Frederick Borden did not think that after Parliament had accepted the principle of Mr. Aylesworth's bill this special committee had authority to deal with the question of jurisdiction.

On motion of Mr. Maclean the committee proceeded to discuss the various sections of the bill.

THREE WITNESSES.

Examined Monday At Hamilton in the Grocers' Guild Inquiry.

Hamilton, June 19.—Yesterday James Irving, Toronto, agent for W. H. Dunn, Montreal, who handled Babbitt's soap and other goods, said at the Grocers' Guild inquiry that after an argument with H. C. Beckett he refused to sell goods to the Wholesale Grocers' Co., Hamilton, because Mr. Beckett said the company was made up of retail grocers. He said that if he sold to that company the guild would have refused to buy from him.

W. J. Graham, an Owen Sound carrier, admitted that he engaged in business, although he was the collector of inland revenue at that town.

R. L. Innes, secretary of the Cannery, Limited, admitted that his company had an agreement with the guild, but was not bound to sell to the guild members. His firm had refused to sell the Wholesale Grocers' Co., Hamilton, because he had made enquiries and had found that it was a combination of retailers. The company declined to sell to similar companies.

CHEAP MONEY FOR MONTREAL.

Government to Renew Harbor Bonds at Half Prevailing Interest.

Montreal, June 19.—Last evening Hon. Mr. Brodeur said, at the banquet given in the Drill Hall to the Minister of Marine:

"Mr. Prefontaine was always faithful to the Liberal cause and placed his energies at the disposal of his political friends. We felt sorry that, after he had disappeared, his opponents tried to investigate his administration. The people were shocked at such conduct, and I certainly did my duty in denouncing such conduct."

There were about a thousand at the tables, presided over by Premier Gouin.

Speaking of the port of Montreal, Hon. Mr. Brodeur announced that the Government would soon introduce legislation to redeem certain harbor bonds which pay 5 per cent and advance the money at 3 per cent, and thus reduce the port's liabilities.

All Willing to Help Canada.

Ottawa, June 19.—Recently the superintendent of the commercial agencies addressed circulars to all British consuls-general and consuls in the United States, with a view of getting their assistance unconditionally in the interests of Canadian trade. Replies have been received from the British consuls at Chicago, Boston, New York, Galveston, Portland, Baltimore, San Francisco, Philadelphia, New Orleans and Savannah, all agreeing to do what they can to further Canadian interests in the localities which they represent.

Garden Party as a Bribe.

London, June 19.—As a result of a petition, Thomas Charles Agnew-Robartes, eldest son of Viscount Clifden, member of Parliament (Liberal) for Cornwall, has been named by the electoral law as a candidate for the vacant seat in the constituency of Cornwall. The entertainment of voters at a garden party was the principal item in the complaint.

Granted an Injunction.

Toronto, June 19.—The Keewatin Power Co. was yesterday successful in securing an injunction restraining the municipality of Kenora from proceeding with the building of a municipal power plant on the east branch of the Winnipeg River. The date of trial was fixed at July 12, at Kenora.

Mackay to Contest Renfrew.

Pembroke, June 19.—Albert Mackay, Liberal, son of the late T. L. Mackay, ex-M. P., was nominated for the House of Commons by-election here yesterday for the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. P. White, Conservative, recently deceased.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, June 19.—(Special)—Cable advices from Liverpool and London on Canadian cattle came steady at 11c to 11 1/2c, and the Glasgow market was firmer. The demand for ocean freight space has been considerable business has been done. The market is stronger, and rates for July are 2 1/2c to 3c higher than for June except Bristol; engagements to Liverpool, Glasgow and Manchester have been made for July at 40c; London at 32 1/2c; Bristol, July and August at 30c. Receipts for the week were 600 cattle, 140 sheep; receipts were 700 cattle, 30 sheep, 800 sheep and lambs, 200 calves and 1100 hogs. Of the hogs, 700 were bought in the west by the packers, consequently the supply on the market for sale was small; but, in spite of this fact, and stronger prices for the week were done at \$7.50 to \$7.75 per 100 lb. weighed off cars. The butchers were out strong and trade was good, with the price of cattle and calves held all around. Prime beefs sold at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb.; pretty good cattle, 4c to 4 1/2c; and common, 3 1/2c to 4c per lb. Milkmen's stockpiles were numerous and sold at 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c. Good milk cows were in good demand at \$4.50 to \$5.50; other cows sold at \$3 to \$4 each. Good calves sold at \$8 to \$9 each, the others at \$2.50 to \$4 each. Sheep sold at \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt. Store pigs sold at \$7 to \$11 each, and the young pigs at \$1.75 to \$3 each.
