## BRISCONS' OPERA HOUSE BLOCK

### SUCCESSFUL SOCIAL

A very pleasant time was spent at Schreier's school house in Raleigh last evening, when the Methodist church of that place gave an outdoor tea meeting and social.

The program was provided by a crowd of young people from the Victoria avenue Methodist church under the charge of Robert Killop. J. W. Humphrey and Rev. Mr. Mallot gave addresses, Harry Horstead sang, and a male quartet composed of Messrs. Horstead, Holman, Side and Holman gave a number of selections. Ald. Archie McCoig, of this city, was the chairman. A local program was also given. Rev. Mr. McCormick, the pastor, reported the proceeds \$60, which was very satisfactory indeed.

### WATERWORTH CASE

The Waterworth case, which has created so much interest among the farmers of Kent County, came up again at the Court House this morning before Judge Dowlin.

This is a case of alleged fraud against the Waterworths for selling refrigerators under false pretences.

The crown put in two witnesses, William Dodson and S. McDowell, who both swore that they bought creamers which were stuffed with sawdust. One of the machines, stuffed with sawdust, was exhibited in the court.

The defendants called several witnesses, among them Mr. Dawson, manager of the Dawson Commission Company, who admitted on cross examination by Mr. Smith, that he never authorized the Waterworths to act as purchasing agents and that there never were to be refrigerator cars at Merlin and Tabary to get the farmers' stuff as the farmers claim the Waterworths represented.

C. Lumley, the manufacturer, explained the construction of the machine and claimed it would do what was claimed for it.

On cross examination he admitted that no test had been made of it in Guelph long side of a cream separator as the farmers claim the Waterworths told them there had been.

When the Court adjourned Geo. Waterworth the prisoner, had given evidence in chief, in which he denied practically everything the farmers alleged had been told to them and claimed the machine was all he said it was, and that their dealing was all fair and above board.

Mr. Smith, Crown Attorney, started his cross examination, when the court resumed at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
