**"A Talking Clock."**

Owing to extreme pressure of business it was impossible in last week's issue to give our readers a fair report of the lecture on "A Talking Clock and its Articulations," delivered by the Rev. S. B. Dunn of Granville Ferry in the Methodist church. The Rev. lecturer on being introduced by the chairman reminded his audience that of all subjects his was a most striking one and so much was it in advance of other things that it best all time and even beat its own record. Then followed a discourse on the various inventions from remote ages to the present for measuring time, in which reference was made to the candles used by Alfred, sand-glass, sun-dial, water-clock, flowers and the time-piece of the present day.

The lecturer then spoke of the period when clocks kept time by the action of weights, and while he showed that by removing the pressure the clock would cease to work, and also drew a comparison between this and many people who, while they complained of the pressure brought to bear on them, yet would cease to work if that pressure were removed. Man was the talking clock and the eloquent references to the secret workings and mainspring of action, to the hands ever ready for good work, to the honest face telling the workings within, were fraught with lessons of great value. In applying the subject the lecturer enforced the following lessons as suggested by the clock:—  
The value of time—never to go in debt or on tick; that as a clock was never heard in the world, was a nothing, unless it had a bell with a ring, so man was a nothing until he secured a *bell* with a ring, and of course it was brought home to all the single men that *bell*, happiness they should ring their *bell*.

The interest was preserved throughout and the rapid attention showed that it was a thoroughly appreciative audience that listened to this sparkling, thoughtful and unique lecture. It is understood that Mr. Dunn will visit our town again and we can assure him a hearty welcome.
