The strength of the parties by provinces
at the time of the dissolution of parlia-
ment was as follows, with two seats vac-
ant in Quebec: Ontario, 37 ministerial,
35 opposition; Quebec, ministerial 35,
opposition 28; Nova Scotia, ministerial
15, opposition 6; New Brunswick,
ministerial 11, opposition 5; Prince
Edward Island, ministerial 0, opposition
1; Manitoba, ministerial 4, opposition 6;
British Columbia, ministerial 6;
opposition 0; North-west Territories,
ministerial 4, opposition 0. Total,
ministerial 133, opposition 81. With
two vacant seats in the house, and
without the speaker, the Government's
majority at the time of dissolution was
exactly 50.

DEAR SIR,—I see that a meeting has
been held to consider the question of
extending the C. V. R. from Centreville
to Middleton. I also hear that other
meetings are to be engaged in. What do

right of way to build a road parallel with

conditions. If they will take the trouble

opening of the "Gaspereau" railway, they
will see what he said about granting sub-
sidies. Do they expect to get all the
accommodation they want here, and other
counties with not a mile of railway in
them? It would not be justice, and the
government would not be justified in
granting them any help. Let them
build it out of their own pockets if they
want it, or drop the question.
