This traitor who holds up a nation for gain!



Cultivation of Back Yards and Vacant Lots.

Every back yard should be used for the cultivation of fruit and vegetables. Suburban areas should be utilized for food production. Much could be done by individual households if people only realize the desperate seriousness of the situation and the fact that every ounce of food is a necessary and important contribution in the fight against defeat. Hundreds of thousands of men and women, boys and girls, could spare a short time each day to cultivate a garden and thus to grow food which would release other food commodities for shipment overseas. The staffs of industrial establishments, both office and factory, could do much by organizing clubs to cultivate areas near their own places of employment or vacant lots elsewhere in the municipality. Girl Guides and Boy Scouts could also make a real contribution towards relief to the situation. In this way a large part of the requirements of cities and towns, in so far as vegetables are concerned, would be supplied by back yard and vacant lot cultivation, so that market gardeners could use their land in part for vegetable crops.

Canada's Annual Dairy Exports.

The annual report of the Dept. of Labor shows that during the last fiscal year the quantity of butter exported was 1,228,753 lbs., valued at \$399,046. During the previous year the quantity exported was 7,900,453 pounds, valued at \$2,491,924. Cheese was exported to the amount of 180,733,436 pounds, valued at \$56,721,130. The aggregate value of butter, cheese, condensed milk, fresh cream exported from Canada during the year amounts to the fine total of \$4,167,705, a sum which is \$10,000,000 in excess of any previous year.

Making the Most of Suet.

In substituting something for something else, we must understand two facts: First, that the produce may be quite satisfactory, but it probably will not be exactly the same as the 'old recipe' or the 'old way.' We must be willing to judge the new dish on the basis of its wholesomeness and palatability regardless of our previous notions about that particular dish. If delicious biscuits can be made with suet instead of with butter and lard, forget that Aunt Mandy always used the latter and her biscuits were considered perfect.
Suet has proved to stand next to butter in possessing the necessary qualities for growth and good health. Aside from this fact, it is also the most economical substitute. Considered from the actual amount of energy produced, suet costs half as much as lard and only one-third as butter. To prepare suet for cooking purposes careful rendering is necessary.
Purchase kidney suet. Remove the fleshy membrane, chop the meat fine or grind in a meat grinder. Boil with cold water and heat gently until the boiling point is reached. Simmer gently until a layer of fat separates on top and the water is clear underneath. Remove from the heat and cool. A hard cake of fat will form, which should be removed and heated carefully again to remove any water; then strain. Suet can be used satisfactorily in the preparation of the following dishes:
With meat substitutes, as in baked peas soup; in milk gravy or plain white sauce. For basting meat, or other fish. In muffins, gingerbread, spice molasses and fruit cakes and cookies it can be added in the melted form. For biscuits, shortcakes, dumplings and piecrust it may be chopped very fine or ground and worked into the flour. A slightly rounded tablespoon of chopped suet is equivalent to one level tablespoonful of rendered suet or any other fat.

Beef Fat for Shortening.

I have used beef fat for many years and prefer it to any shortening on the market. I use it for pastry, cake and all kinds of frying. I get the suet, cut it in small pieces, soak it in an iron kettle on the stove 'til about one teaspoon of salt and cook it till the scraps are light brown. Drain in colander. When cold, beat it with a wooden paddle till it is as white as beaten whites of eggs.
