RESIDENCE RULE HAS BEEN ADOPTED BY UNITED STATES Players Must be Registered By August First.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Feb. 17.—The much discussed "residence rule" has been adopted by the United States Amateur Hockey Association, Secretary Roy D. Schooley announced here after a mail vote on the matter last night. The rule requires that a player must reside in the city which he represents on the August First preceding the hockey season, or, at least, be a student at some school in the city.

Officials of the league said passage of the measure will mean a resumption of relations between the Canadian and United States ice forces. Its purpose is to prevent the importation of Canadian players for United States teams.


