## FARMERS' CANDIDATE FOR CARLETON CO.

Want Man in Field—Election  
in the Fall Says Premier  
Foster.

Woodstock, July 10.—Delegates to the number of eighty representing one thousand members in Carleton county of the United Farmers of Canada, met in the Vocational School this afternoon to nominate a candidate for the coming by-election.

A candidate was not nominated but a committee was appointed to wait upon the leaders of both political parties in this county and request that the seat be given by acclamation to the candidate to be nominated by the United Farmers at a convention to be held later. C. L. Smith, the president, who presided, stated that Premier Foster recently told him that the by-election would be held this fall.

C. Gordon Sharpe, the secretary, made a suggestion that the newspaper men be requested to retire from the meeting, but the convention decided to let them remain.

After three hours' session an amendment moved by Fred Brown seconded by C. Gordon Sharpe, that in the event of the political parties turned down the request of the secretary the organization will but a man in the field was defeated. An amendment moved by George McLeod, seconded by Mr. Peters, that it would be unwise at this time to put a candidate in the field was also defeated.

The following motion, which was supported by President Smith, was carried by a standing vote: Moved by T. W. Caldwell, seconded by Thomas Doherty, that we appoint a committee of committees to wait upon both political parties in this county and request that the candidate of the United Farmers be given an election by acclamation to fill the vacancy caused by the death of G. L. White, M. L. A.

The following committee, the first two Conservatives and the

last two Liberals, were appointed to carry out the wishes of the convention in the resolution: E. W. Melville, of Peel; A. A. H. Margison, of East Centreville; C. L. Smith of Woodstock, T. W. Caldwell of Florenceville.

One delegate suggested that there were no Liberals or Conservatives at present, but George McLeod had a well founded suspicion that in Carleton county the old political machines were well oiled and could start on a moment's notice.

A resolution was carried, moved by T. W. Caldwell, placing the convention on record as opposed to bribery at elections, suggesting that it be fought to a finish because by it the politicians are under the control of the corporations that put up the money to run elections.

Some of the delegates said they had been voting Liberal for 21 years, but they would heartily support a Conservative if one was nominated by the farmers. As showing the injustice practiced upon the farmers, C. Gordon Sharpe said that there was not one farmer among the six candidates in this county at the last election; that neither of the two representatives at present were farmers; that neither of the two candidates likely to be nominated by the two parties, Messrs. Morgan and McCain, were farmers, and that only two farmers had seats in the legislature at present. After passing votes of thanks to the reporters and to the caretaker the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the chair when the committee would be ready to report.
