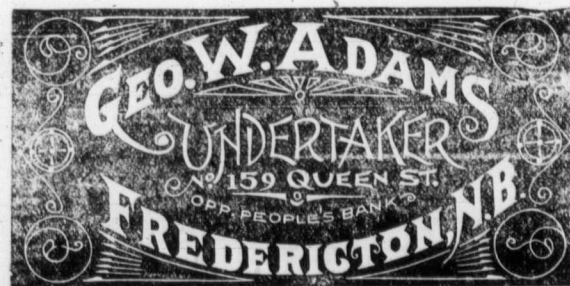

## NEW CHIEF JUSTICE.

Sir Henri Elzear Taschereau Sworn Into Office by the Governor General.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.—The Council Chamber was the scene of an unusual gathering at noon today, when Sir Henri Elzear Taschereau was sworn in as Chief Justice of Canada. The first to arrive at the Chamber were Sir Louis Davies and Justice Sedgewick, and soon after Hon. R. W. Scott and Sir Richard Cartwright. Acting Premier Hon. Charles F. Poirer and Hon. Sydney Fisher almost immediately arrived, followed soon after by Sir Henri Elzear Taschereau and Justice Gauthier. Hon. R. W. Scott then left the room to advise His Excellency that all were in waiting and at noon the gun boomed forth. Lord Minto, attended by Hon. Captain Hughes, left his office and proceeded to the Council Chamber where Hon. David Mills, Hon. James Sutherland and Hon. Raymond Fontaine joined them. Sheriff Sweetland and Mr. Cameron, Registrar of the Supreme Court, were also in attendance. All being placed, Mr. Mager, clerk of Privy Council, handed Sir Henri a Bible and read the oath: "I swear to and will faithfully discharge the duties of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, to which office I have been appointed." Sir Henri then took the oath and the ceremony was ended. The Privy Counsellors and visitors who are not members of the Cabinet having withdrawn, a short meeting of Council was then held.

### THE COAL COMMISSION.

Examination of a Seranton Doctor as to Health Conditions.

Of Tollers in the Great Underground Industry.

Why Children Should Not Be Allowed to Work in Mines.

SERANTON, Pa., Nov. 21.—The examination of Dr. B. H. Gibbons of Seranton was resumed when the anthracite commission re-commenced today. He said that the occupation of a miner is full of risks to the lungs, pleurisy, cough, asthma, and other diseases. He believed the day will come when men will be required to undergo medical examination before they undertake mining. Children, he said, who have suffered from any form of disease of the respiratory passages or bronchial tubes, or pneumonia, should never be admitted in the mines under the age of 15 years, because they should have a chance for the elimination of the predisposing factor in the so-called miners' asthma. Dr. Gibbons then described the surface indications of miners' asthma. He said that he did not mean to be understood as saying that miners form an unhealthy class, but they are debilitated and run down. He spoke of the necessity for improved ambulance service at the different collieries. On cross examination Dr. Gibbons said that he did not believe there was an ambulance in the entire coal regions which had sterile blankets or wash toilet shelf. "In fact," said the doctor, "they are a much of infection. Every ambulance carries death and disease to every unfortunate miner who is placed in it."

### GERMAN FINANCES.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—In the Reichstag today, the Secretary of the Treasury, Baron Von Tschammer, announced that the Imperial budget showed a deficiency of \$37,000,000.

### RUSSIAN RAILWAY.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—It is announced that the construction of the Russian railroad from Erivan, a town of Russia 10 miles from Tiflis, to the Persian frontier, will be commenced at the beginning of 1903.

### C. P. R. CONDUCTORS

Want an Increase of 25 per cent. Company Offers 10 per cent.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—The general committee of C. P. R. conductors and trainmen have not yet succeeded in reaching an agreement with the company, although they have been in conference for several weeks. The men are asking for an increase of 25 per cent in wages east of Port William. The company at first offered seven per cent, and has since increased this to ten per cent, but the men have not yet accepted the offer. There is no doubt, however, that an agreement will ultimately be reached that will be acceptable to all parties.

### HALIFAX DEFENCES.

Minister of Militia in Consultation With Sir Charles Parsons at Halifax.

HALIFAX, Nov. 21.—Sir F. Borden, Minister of Militia and Lord Allyn, Adjutant General of Militia, arrived at Halifax this morning. It is understood that the visit of Messrs. Borden and Allyn is principally in connection with the proposition of the Imperial authorities to have the defences at Halifax and Esquimaux maintained by the Canadian authorities. This afternoon Messrs. Borden and Allyn conferred with Sir Charles Parsons, commander in chief of Imperial forces in Canada, in connection with the matter.

### CUT IN HALF.

The Rates to be Charged by New Pacific Cable.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—It is announced officially that the rates for cables over the new Pacific cable from all parts of Canada to all parts of Australia will be 50 cents per word for commercial cables and twenty cents per word for press despatches. This is a reduction of about fifty per cent. from the rate charged previous to the completion of the new Pacific cable.

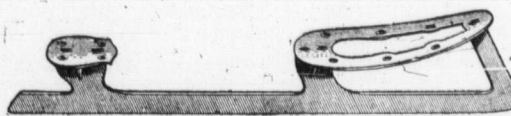
### THE POPE'S HUMOR.
