Witnesses Swore as to Mrs. Turner's Hand in Her Death.

Toronto, Ont., March 20.—(Special.)—At the trial of Minnie Turner this morning, Inspector Duncan and a number of detectives told the story of their visits to Mrs. Turner's house in Poplar Plains road. Besides the owner, they accused Bertha Pearson as the killer. In the search which followed, the detectives found a number of articles which the crown alleges were used in the illegal operation. One was a surgical instrument and the other a blood-stained mattress. Bertha Pearson repeated her story told in the trial at the assizes. She swore that Mrs. Turner operated on Rose Winters. The witness described what was done. She stated that the operation took place on August 13 last.
