NEW INVENTION.—Submarine Navigation
The great invention of the day, the submarine navigation of Dr. Payerne, is about to be put in practice at Cherbourg, the company purchasing the invention, having volunteered to cleanse that harbor free of expense to the government. The secret consists in the discovery of a means whereby artificial air may be produced in sufficient quantity to enable a crew of fourteen men to breathe freely beneath the water for the space of two hours. A curious experiment has been already made at Marseilles, where Dr. Payerne, in company with three sailors, went to the bottom in presence of hundreds of spectators and rose at a considerable distance and climbed the port holes of a man-of-war without being perceived by the crew. Many experiments are about to be tried of the efficacy of this novel means of attack. A submarine fleet of small boats, each to contain a crew of twenty men, is already talked of as being about to be organized for the Black Sea. It seems that no intimation whatever is given, by the slightest ruffle on the surface, of the approach of one of these vessels. The apparatus invented by Dr. Payerne enables the wearer, moreover, to move about with perfect ease at the bottom of the sea, and great anticipations are formed of the immense benefit to be derived in submarine history from the adoption of this new method of becoming acquainted with the hitherto unknown mystery of ocean.

Dr. Walter, of Pittsburg, has removed the main bone in the leg of a boy of 15 years old, from the knee to the ankle. The patient is doing well, and the doctor has the utmost confidence that a new bone will form and the shape and length of the leg be preserved. In that case this will be a triumph of surgery in private practice such as is seldom or never reported from the hospitals.

INFLUENCE OF MIND ON DISEASE.—It would seem as if the study of certain diseases sometimes favored their real or imaginary development. Lasunne died of phthisis, and Corvairant of disease of the heart. When the celebrated Professor Frank was preparing his lectures at Paris, on disease of the heart, his own heart became so disturbed that he was obliged to rest for a while. Rumour says that less than five of the Professors in one of the medical colleges have unjustly suspected their hearts. Medical students, exhausted by a winter session, are apt to be subjects of real or imaginary irregularity of the heart. A young friend attended our lectures last winter, on diseases of the chest, felt an unusual knocking of his heart, after ascending the long college stairs, and required several examinations to satisfy him that there was no danger.

CURIOS INFORMATION.—The Chinese Repository says that criminals are sometimes punished by making them into a candle. The convict is wound around with cotton, saturated with tallow, and then dipped until he presents the appearance of a gigantic candle, when he is taken and after being "stood up" on his father's grave, is lighted.

One of the most convenient new inventions is the speaking tube of guita percha. In London an experiment was tried with a tube seven miles in length, and it was entirely successful. A tune was played at the same time, which gave great amusement to the bystanders. This tube is now introduced into many of our first class dwellings, &c., and as alarm whistles are fixed to the apparatus so doubt their introduction will become general.

More than two thousand of the chief and leading men among the Rajputs in India, with the English commissioners, recently met in Panjab to adopt measures for putting an end to the evil of female infanticide, which prevails among them to a great extent. The proposition was received, by general consent, with acclamations that no one should be allowed to continue the custom.

ODD DIRECTIONS ON LETTERS.—We learn from the "Durham Advertiser," that the following curious direction was found on a letter lately consigned to the post office.— "John Todd.
