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THE Czar. LONDON, Oct. 23. The Czar has offered to the Czartowitch the co-regency, transferring to him the reins of Government, provided that he will concede to the Princess Dolgorouki the title and rank of a princess of the blood, taking precedence over the Grand Dukes, the Czar retaining his Imperial privileges and retaining to Livadia permanently.
