The Japanese captured twenty-one quick firing guns, nineteen ammunition wagons, 1,417 shells, eight machine guns and 37,000 shells for these guns; 1,021 rifles and 350,000 rounds of ammunition; sixty-three orses, ten wagons and 1,244 coats

At Feng Wang Cheng the Japanese captured 357 shells for mountain guns; 188,000 rounds of rifle ammunition, 1,720 coats, 40,000 loaves of bread and other supplies, together with a quantity of tools and telegraph stores.

Tokio, May 20.—It is unofficially reported that small skirmishes are taking place south of Kin Chon. On the Liao Tung peninsula, the Japanese line extends from Chinchaton to Chulasan across a ridge of hills a mile and a half north of Kin Chou, completely dominating that town, which can be taken in half a day when the Japanese are ready to do so. Kin Chon is seven or eight thousand metres north of the peninsula, and forty miles north of Port Arthur.

A NEW type of naval ship has lately been aunched from an English yard. It is 360 feet long, 40 feet beam, and has a mean lraught of 14 feat 2 inches, with a dislacement of 2,920 tons, and 1,700 horse ower. It is expected to have a maximum speed of 25 knots. The armament is light or the type is only expected to be an eye for a fleet of heavier ships.
