LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Eighty-four candidates were advanced to orders in the Catholic Church at the Annual Christmas Ordination at St. James' Cathedral Montreal.

A national memorial to Abraham Lincoln to be erected in Washington at a cost of \$2,000,000, is proposed in a bill introduced recently by Senator Callahan, of Illinois.

In the civic elections in Winnipeg Mr. Brown, the present mayor, was elected by about 2,000 majority. He was the candidate of the segregation of vice supporters.

An order-in-council has been passed at Ottawa making Monday, December 26, and Monday, January 2, public holidays as Christmas and New Year's day fall on Sundays.

Three children of J. E. Pospay, were burned to death when fire destroyed their home at Grossett, Ark. The mother, who made a desperate attempt to save the children was seriously burned and probably will die.

As a result of an explosion in a mine at Arden, Virginia twelve men have lost their lives. Thirteen were in the mine at the time only two escaped, of whom one died shortly after being taken out.

Twelve men are entombed in the Leyden Coal Company's mine fourteen miles west of Denver. A fire started in the mine at the time of the explosion and the timbering of the shaft was ablaze in a moment cutting off escape.

Forty officers and men from H. M. S. Egria from Vancouver, reached St. John, N. B., last for England on the Empress of Britain. The Egria has been engaged for several years doing survey work in British Columbia waters.

A torrential rainstorm has continued in Hazel for three weeks in causing the river to rise to a dangerous level, carrying down telegraph wires and making travelling impossible. During these days the total precipitation has been twenty-seven inches.

A hundred and fifty persons were injured during riots at Calcutta. The trouble grew out of a fight between Hindus and Mohammedans brought about by the intention of the latter to sacrifice cows at the coming Mohammedan religious festival.

Arthur Piers, manager of the C. P. R. steamships, in conference with Sir Thomas Shinghessy at Montreal on the topic of increasing the Pacific and Atlantic services said that two steamers of the most modern type with high speed will be ordered for the Pacific service.

The German steamer Palermo is a total wreck off Cape Cororobdo on the west coast of Galicia, Spain. Her five passengers and crew of about 200 were lost. The vessel struck and went to pieces during a fierce gale last Monday night. The Palermo was a freight and passenger vessel of 686 tons.

Andrew Rossi was sentenced at St. John by Judge Barry to twenty-five years in penitentiary for killing Negro Strassman. This was Rossi's third trial. The jury disagreed on the previous occasions, when the charge was murder, but this time the prisoner pleaded guilty to manslaughter.

The jury in King's Bench London awarded Miss Alexandra Knollys daughter of Lord Knollys, King George's private secretary, damages of \$2,500 in libel suit which she brought against the Periodical "John Bull," for having published a report that the complainant had eloped with an English army officer.

A sensational report from the War Department Washington showing how the country is inadequately protected against invasion from foreign countries was sent to the House as a secret document, and after a number of conferences was returned to the War Department on the ground that the House could not receive a secret report.

F. J. Calder, Dominion Inspector of Fisheries, who arrived in St. John last Wednesday night after a trip down the Bay of Fundy coast, says that he looks for a record breaking lobster season. Since the season opened the catch has been large, and the fishermen who had such poor results during the autumn, are rejoicing.

Canada has been invited to send a contingent of 700 men to represent the Dominion at the Coronation in June. The contingent will be carefully selected. Every part of the Dominion will be drawn upon for the best men in the Militia. Every arm of the service will be represented, and there will be a contingent representing the Northwest Mounted Police. The Militia Council will at once commence the task of organizing a Coronation Contingent.

Mrs. Blanchard Steves was accidentally shot at New Castle, N. B., on the 14 by her husband, who was cleaning a Ross rifle. The magazine, believed to be empty, contained a bullet which struck Mrs. Steves in the back, coming out below the breast. Two doctors were immediately on hand, but the wound was considered mortal. Mrs. Steves is nearly prostrated with grief. There are three small children. She has since died in the hospital.

The population of the States is, according to the census of this year, 91,972,387-00, including the Philippine Islands, and other possessions, about 101,000,000. The increase of the past ten years in the States proper was 15,977,691 or 21 per cent. A table issued by the Census Bureau shows that in the increase in each decade, and the percentage of increase, and the relative standing of the States. New York still leads all the States, with Pennsylvania second, Illinois third and Ohio fourth Texas has jumped to 28th place, and Massachusetts to 29th.
