The Tramp Nuisance.

Several of our cotemporaries have of late been discussing this subject, which becomes an absorbing topic, when winter makes its appearance and the army of tramps, frooping from their summer haunts to towns and cities, parades before the representatives of law and order to be rewarded and dealt with as legal wisdom sees fit. All are of the opinion that, in order to abate this nuisance, imprisonment is the best remedial agent, and commend that every tramp found on the streets be sent to jail for short terms. This remedy would doubtless prove efficacious if properly applied, al though some of its advocates would be surprised to see how kindly the patients would take to it, as a rule. Very few of these tramps are worthy of sympathy, and when the cold weather comes on the majority count themselves fortunate in securing warm quarters and regular meals in prison for a few weeks or which hang equivalent the second stand regular meals in prison for a few weeks or months. The few worthy ones would not nattogether despise such fortune, and be ready to accord it as a temporary release from a hard fate rather than as a punish ment. Imprisonment is not dreaded by the majority, the able bodied and chron ically lazy ones, if not accompanied by labor, and if it is desired to punish then thoroughly put them to work and make there earn their living.
