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## MAY PROHIBIT LIQUOR IN ALL SOCIAL CLUBS

Members of the Miscellaneous  
Private Bills Committee Express  
Themselves as Opposed—Question  
Will be Discussed by the Legis-  
lature in Committee of the Whole.

\*\*\*\*\*  
The opinions of some of the mem-  
bers of the miscellaneous and private  
bills committee prevail in the Legis-  
lature there is little hope that social  
clubs who in future seek incorpo-  
ration will be given the privilege of  
having bars for the sale of liquor on  
their premises. The committee, the  
governor of which is J. A. McDougall  
M.P.P. held its first session this  
morning with all the members in at-  
tendance.

\*\*\*\*\*  
The strongest opponent to granting  
the privilege to liquor at clubs is  
George P. Smith, M.P.P. of Cam-  
rose. Mr. Smith stated that he would  
not give to the incorporation of  
any club which of incorporation  
had not a provision that liquor must  
not be handled in its rooms. He in-  
sisted that the case of the Canadian  
club at Camrose where no liquor is  
allowed, and said that many of  
these clubs are engaged in social  
places for young men and to have  
liquor there would be putting tempta-

CZARINA'S PHYSICIAN SUICIDES.  
Dr. Botkin Distressed Because He  
Diagnosed Her Case Wrongly.

Paris, Feb. 23—A despatch from  
St. Petersburg to the "Journal"  
says Dr. Botkin, the Czarina's private  
medical attendant, died suddenly a  
short time ago. It is now stated  
that the doctor committed suicide in  
consequence of the discovery that he  
made a serious mistake in diagnosing  
the malady from which the Czarina  
is suffering, and in preventing foreign  
physicians from being called in con-  
sultation. The condition of the  
Czarina became worse and the Czar  
reproached Dr. Botkin, who became  
so distressed in mind that he took a  
dose of poison.

## THIBETAN HIGH PRIEST FUGITIVE FROM CHINESE

Delai Lama Is In Hiding in Calcutta  
and Seeking Protection of British  
Government From His  
Pursuers.

Calcutta, Feb. 24—Delai Lama of  
Thibet, in hiding in this city, today  
sent a messenger to Lord Minto, vic-  
eroi, asking for an interview. Lord  
Minto took the request under consid-  
eration, but it is probable that an op-  
portunity will not be given to the  
Thibetan leader to air his grievances  
against the Chinese for their invasion  
of the sacred city of Lhasa. The  
messenger informed Lord Minto that  
Delai Lama was in disguise in a re-  
mote part of the city and that he  
wished to beg place of refuge and  
protection from the British govern-  
ment. The latter does not wish to  
destroy the cordials existing  
with China by officially recognizing  
the Thibetan fugitive.

\*\*\*\*\*  
Delai Lama had a narrow escape  
from capture when the British troops  
captured the sacred city. He had an-  
ticipated victory for his own troops  
and it was not until the Emperor's  
soldiers were almost at the confines of  
the palace that the danger of the situ-  
ation was realized. Fleeing into the  
hills, he hid in the high priest of  
Thibet, donned clothing belonging to  
one of the cooks. In that way he  
evaded discovery, remained in hiding  
until several of his advisers joined  
him with funds and accompanied him  
north.

Another Cyclone Is Approaching  
Shores of Western Europe.

London, Feb. 21—Belated reports  
of the storm which raged intermit-  
tently for four days showed damage  
in many parts of the United Kingdom  
amounting to thousands of pounds.  
In many places roofs were torn from  
houses, hundreds of trees were blown  
down, and the telegraph and telephone  
lines were laid low.

The telegraph service was greatly  
delayed today.  
Advices indicate that another cy-  
clone is approaching from across  
the Atlantic. The severest damage  
in North Wales, where farm  
buildings and telegraph lines suffered  
severely. Several boats were  
drowned at the various ports. The  
French bark, "Marengo," was wrecked  
near Nagsaki, Japan, with exhibits for  
the Anglo-Japanese exhibition here,  
which went ashore near Margate. Friday  
is breaking up. The crew of the  
"Wilson liner, Galileo, was blown  
aboard in the "Humber" during the  
night. Tugs were attempting to float  
the vessel today. A large steamer was  
seen off the Berwickshire coast last  
night helpless through disabled ma-  
chinery and drifting towards May Is-  
land. Several distinct earthquakes  
lasting two minutes were felt in  
Quebec this morning.

QUARRELLED WITH SWEETHEART.  
This Is Given as Cause of J. B. Sargent's  
Suicide.

New Westminster, B.C., Feb. 21—An  
inquest was held today into the cir-  
cumstances of the death of J. B. Sargent,  
who hanged himself in his room in the  
Depot Hotel, here Saturday. The jury  
returned a verdict of suicide while tem-  
porarily insane.

Letters were found in the dead man's  
pocket from a young woman presumed  
to be his sweetheart who resides in Van-  
couver. The letters indicate that there  
was a quarrel between Sargent and the  
woman. The body is still lying at Mur-  
phy's undertaking establishment, await-  
ing the arrival of the dead man's brother  
from Portland, Oregon. The father  
Rev. J. P. Sargent, archdeacon of the  
diocese of Qu'Appelle, has also been  
notified.

SULTAN IN GOOD HEALTH

Vienna, Feb. 23—The Constantinople  
correspondent of the Neue Freie  
Presse has had an interview with the  
minister of war in regard to the con-  
dition of Abdul Hamid, the former  
Sultan, who is now prisoner at Salo-  
nika, and who has been reported as  
crazy and also as dying. The war min-  
ister stated that the health of the  
former sultan is perfectly satisfactory.

Victim of His Own Bomb.  
Amoy, China, Feb. 23—A Japanese  
was killed here by the accidental  
ignition of a high explosive in his  
clothing. It is suspected that the  
man had planned an assassination.

## BOSTON HISTORIAN CREATES SENSATION

Issues Book Dealing With Some  
American Ideas—History Minus  
Glomer—Benjamin Franklin  
He Says, Was a Mail Thief, Noth-  
ing More or Less.

Boston, Feb. 23—James Henry  
Stark, a local historian, has provoked  
much criticism and abuse by state-  
ments contained in his latest book,  
"The Loyalists of Massachusetts and  
the Other Side of the American Revo-  
lution." Mr. Stark calmly asserts  
that his book contains truths which he  
has gathered after years of research  
and which other historians have will-  
fully passed by.

\*\*\*\*\*  
His pigues teen with facts that de-  
molish the altars erected to Massa-  
chusetts' heroes of the Revolution,  
and are extremely humiliating to  
families who pride themselves on the  
immaculacy of their ancestors.

\*\*\*\*\*  
Patriotic societies in Boston, such  
as the Sons of the Revolution, are  
deeply aroused, as the book contains  
many damaging statements that can-  
not be refuted.

\*\*\*\*\*  
Concerning the causes of the Ameri-  
can Revolution, Mr. Stark's book  
says:—  
"In Virginia the revolutionary  
movement of the poor whites, or  
"crackers," led by Patrick Henry, was  
against the planter aristocracy. It was  
only very slowly and very delibera-  
tely that Washington identified him-  
self with the disunionist cause."

\*\*\*\*\*  
Concerning Patrick Henry.  
"Patrick Henry was one of the most  
successful men living. He had been  
successfully a storekeeper, a farmer,  
and a shipkeeper, but he failed in all  
these pursuits and became a bank-  
rupt at twenty-four. Then he studied  
law a few weeks and practised a few  
years. Finally he embarked on the  
stormy sea of politics. One day he  
worked himself into a fine frenzy and  
in a most dramatic manner demanded  
"liberty or death," although he had  
both freely at his disposal."

\*\*\*\*\*  
This One a Defaulter.  
"John Adams joined the disunion-  
ist, probably because he saw that if  
the revolution was successful, there  
would be great opportunity for ad-  
vancement under the new govern-  
ment. This proved to be the case."

\*\*\*\*\*  
That Samuel Adams was a defaulter.  
Mr. Stark proves in a copy of a letter  
sent by Mr. Adams to the town of  
Boston, of which he was the tax col-  
lector. Mr. Adams' surerities had to  
pay \$5,000.

\*\*\*\*\*  
Of the Boston massacre the book  
says:—  
"The rioters repeatedly challenged  
the soldiers to fire, and the soldiers  
were ordered to fire. The result was  
the death of five soldiers and the  
wounding of several others. The  
book states that the soldiers were  
ordered to fire by a British officer  
named Thomas. The book also states  
that the soldiers were ordered to fire  
because they were afraid of the  
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
