Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

Only two lines of forts, both known as Tchatalja, one to the N. W. of the fortress of Adrianople and the other stretching across the Peninsula outside Constantinople now stand between Turkey and the total obliteration of her power in Europe. On neither of these lines of forts can much reliance be placed in view of what has happened in other places which were supposed to be strongly fortified. So confident are the Bulgarians of their ability to overcome the shattered Army of Nazim Pasha that part of their Army is being sent back to Adrianople. It will there complete the investment of that fortress, and carry on the siege; if the place is not carried by storm, it will be starved into submission. There seems to be no escape for the Turks. The Bulgarians are following up their successes with a dash that surprises the world. They are endeavouring, and perhaps have succeeded in doing so, to force troops from Serai between the routed Turkish Army and the Tchatalja line. This move would put an end to all Turkish resistance and stop the defeated and maddened Ottomans from reaching Constantinople, where their arrival is much feared by the population. If the Bulgarians succeed in cutting the flying Turks off from Tchatalja, they are likely to go on to Constantinople, where they will dictate terms of peace? They are not likely, however, to stay in Constantinople, as there is a Bulgarian legend which says that any nation occupying that city is certain to be in perpetual trouble with its neighbours. What the Bulgarians have always aimed at is the occupation of the province of Adrianople, which runs down to the line between the Black Sea and the Sea of Marmora, near the base of the peninsula. The Turkish troops might have found a way of retreat towards Port Redesto, on the Sea of Marmora, but this is now occupied by Bulgarians. The thorough knowledge of the country, which enabled the Bulgarians to advance so rapidly, has also been used to block every avenue of escape for Turkey. There is still some fighting spirit left in the Turks at Adrianople, and from Bulgarian sources some accounts of desperate sorties made by the garrison. In fact, the Bulgarians have had the hardest kind of fighting to contend against.

PORTSMOUTH, Nov. 3.

Unusual activity in the Portsmouth dockyards is reported in a special edition of the Evening News, which says that preparations are being made to prepare the sixth destroyer flotilla for sea. An official explanation, says the News, is that this is being done for the quarterly mobilizations, on Monday, but we understand that the preparations are of a much more warlike nature. Active service ratings have been recalled by notice and special messages, since 2 p.m., and the men have been directed to proceed aboard their ships, by 8.15 this evening. The News adds it is rumored that the flotilla will sail to-night under sealed orders. Notices have been posted, ordering all submarine men to return to their boats at once. Men on leave have been called by wire to other naval ports.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

From all the capitals of Europe comes reports of the efforts of the Powers to reach an agreement in regard to the form of intervention, by nothing has been definitely decided beyond a general approval of the French proposals. In the meantime war vessels of the Powers are hurrying to protect the Christians among the Turkish population, whose danger according to most correspondents, is very real.

DEVONPORT, Nov. 3.

The officers and men attached to the seventh destroyer flotilla were ordered to return to their ships by Saturday night at the latest. With the parent ships and submarines together 35 vessels are affected. These will be ready to sail on Sunday and other on Monday, it is believed for the East.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 3.

All the officers and men of the war craft here were ordered to board their ships at 7 a.m. Sunday. Later, an Admiralty despatch ordered those of the fifth destroyer flotilla aboard their ships at 11 p.m. on Saturday at the latest.

GIBRALTAR, Nov. 3.

The British cruiser Dartmouth passed here to-day bound for the Levant. The third battle squadron will arrive from England to-morrow morning, and proceed eastward after a stay of one hour.

SOPIA, Nov. 3.

The official newspaper, Miri, states that before evacuating Bunarhisar, the Turks shut up 200 Bulgarians in the barracks and set fire thereto. All perished in the flames.

Shortly after midnight Saturday, Const. Tucker and Crocker, who were doing night duty found a female, who is well known to the police, acting disorderly near the King's Wharf. She was drunk and incapable and liable to go overboard if not carefully watched. The officers, in consequence, arrested her. Last evening two blue-jackets visited the police station and wanted to pay a fine for the release of the prisoner. They were ordered out and but that they fled quickly would have been held in custody themselves.

### Pomeranian Arrives.

SHIP RECLASSED.

The R. M. S. Pomeranian, Captain Braith, arrived at 11 a.m. yesterday from Liverpool, which port she left 8 days previous. The usual head winds experienced at this season of the year coming over the North Atlantic were encountered. She brought 850 tons of cargo, 50 packages of mail and as passengers in saloon—Rev. McDermott, wife and child and four in steerage. Since the ship was here last she was reclassified and refitted. She was on the stocks at Glasgow, received a thorough overhauling, and some extensive alterations were made. Special attention was given the dining room of the ship. In this respect the Pomeranian is now not inferior to any other Allan boat running to St. John's. Provision has been made for the accommodation of fifty-eight persons in the saloon which formerly could only take twenty. The state rooms are well furnished, lighted and ventilated. The ship's engines have also been overhauled. The Pomeranian will only make the one trip on the St. John's route after which she will take up a service between London, Havre and St. John, N.B.

The schr. Freedom from Pernambuco passed Cape Race at 10.30 a.m. Thursday.

The brigtn. Olinda arrived at Gibraltar Friday after a good run from Black Tickle, Labrador.

### Engine Derailed.

The Bruce express which arrived here last night at 9 o'clock met with an accident near Grand Lake when the engine, owing to a "greasy" rail, went off the track Saturday night. The couplings broke and the engine left the rails but none of the cars of the train went with it. The telegrapher cut in and wired headquarters and a special engine was sent forward from Bishop's Falls and took the express here. A delay of nine hours was caused as a result of the accident. A gang of men got the derailed engine on the track.
