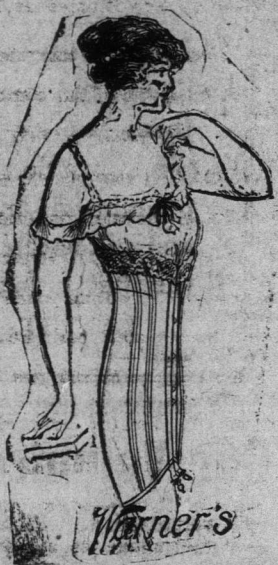

When Comparisons are Odious.

"Y-e-s, they're both nice girls," I caught myself saying the other day, "but, I never liked the younger one so well as the older." The moment that last clause had left the tip of my tongue I would have called it back if I had the power.

Comparisons are odious. Such a statement could do no good and it might do harm. For strange as it may seem to the normal mind, there are everywhere happy people waiting to pounce down on such a statement and carry it where it will give pain. My own faults are like the sands of the sea in number, but I must say I cannot even conceive the state of mind in which one person cold-bloodedly goes to another and says, "So-and-so said this or that disagreeable thing about you."

To return to the main theme, the desire to compare and to measure by a foot-rule of merit or liking is one of the most deep-rooted instincts of the human mind.

"Take the One That You Love Best."

"Take the one that you love best before you close your eyes to rest," we chant at the age of six, and watch the selection with absorbed interest. In high school it has recently become a popular device for the class to vote as to which member of it is the most popular, which the prettiest, which

the cleverest, etc. And the newspaper editor who wants some device to stimulate his readers into writing to the paper need not hunt for anything new. He may always rely on the old plan of having them express their opinion as to who is the greatest actress or the greatest ball player, or what are the ten greatest books. Critics, again, always find it easier to awaken interest by comparing the merits of various books, and plays than by discussing each book or play as an entity to be judged entirely on its own merits.

Measuring Distance by the Bushel. Of course there is nothing wrong in this instinctive desire for comparison. The only wrong is to overdo it and to forget that there are many things that cannot be compared. Comparisons are odious when you forcibly try to measure one thing by another of an entirely different nature. You cannot compare inches with volts or measure distance by the bushel. The old question as to whether a woman should love her children or her husband best is an example of this kind of forced unnatural comparisons.

If you ask a little nephew of mine which he likes best, his father or mother, he always smiles very sweetly and says "I like them both best." That is certainly a very "canny" way to deal with an unfair question, and I think many of us grown-ups would do well to copy his unwillingness to make comparisons where comparisons should not be made.

Household Notes

Sweeping can be made much easier if you have painted floors, with small rugs.

An excellent stew is made of soup meat and macaroni, flavored with tomatoes.

Stale macaroons should be pounded and used to flavor custards or various puddings.

To prevent honey becoming "sugary" keep tightly covered and always in a dark place.

Warmed-up meat loses flavor, therefore the gravy should be very good and well seasoned.

Fathers' or big brothers' neglect to children can be very well out over into nightshirts for little boys.

When eggs crack in boiling add a teaspoonful of salt to the water and the whites will not come out.

Kneading boards and such things should be kept in a cupboard or some place entirely free from dust.

String any spare buttons you may have on a cord that they may be easy to get when you want them.

To keep eyeglasses from steaming in cold weather rub with vaseline and polish with a silk handkerchief.

When boiling rice add a little lemon juice to the water. This makes the rice white and separates the grains.

Add a little salt to gasoline before using it to clean spots on fabrics and no ring will remain around the spot.

Let the member of the household who wishes to gain weight remember that the kind of food is more important than the quantity.

To wash china silk waists use lukewarm soap suds. Then rinse in two cool waters and roll in a Turkish towel for two hours before ironing.

Cream cheese mixed with chopped celery and olives and formed into balls which are then rolled in chopped nuts make a delicious salad, served on lettuce leaves with French dressing.

When potatoes are inclined to turn black in cooking add a few drops of vinegar to the water in which they are boiled. This is excellent, as it makes the potatoes beautifully white and mealy.

Concentrated ammonia— one part ammonia to six parts water—can be used to remove varnish. Moisten a small portion of the varnished wood, scrub with a stiff brush and the varnish can be easily scraped off.

For home-made camphorated oil take 1 oz. turpentine, 1 oz. sweet oil, 1 lb. cake of camphor. Cut camphor into small pieces, put into a bottle with turpentine and sweet oil, and shake well until dissolved. It is then ready for use.

When making jelly, before turning it out of the molds into a saucer, wipe the latter with a damp cloth. This will be found very good, as the jelly will slip over the center of the dish and not stick to one side of it, as it does when no dampening is done.

Washing in hard water and neglecting to thoroughly dry the hands after washing are frequent causes of chaps and chilblains on the hands. The most effective water-softerner in winter, to my mind, is oatmeal, though a little trouble is entailed in preparing it for use.

BRITISH WAR PLANE BEATS ZEPPELINS.

Chicago, Jan. 28.—A letter received by the Chicago Herald from London contains the information that England is far readier than the world believes in the matter of aircraft.

In spite of the secrecy thrown around everything relating to war preparations, it is an open secret in military circles that the British Government has in its possession a number of "Zeppelins," and what are believed to be far more effective, a lot of huge aeroplanes each capable of carrying a crew of 21 men and armed with a number of powerful anti-aircraft guns.

Prior to the war the British army aeronautic service placed small confidence in Zeppelins and decided the possibility that they could work much harm.

During the recent raid of Cuxhaven the case with which Zeppelins were

driven off by the British seaplanes was pointed to as evidence of the non-value of the German craft. But the British authorities apparently determined to be as well equipped in every respect as their enemy and acquired dirigibles of the German type.

The number of such dirigibles flying the British flag is not known, but it is said to be sufficient to make a decided impression when the strategic moment for their use arrives.

More faith is placed by British flyers in the enormous aeroplanes which have been constructed. These planes have been equipped with a special anti-aircraft gun designed to take up the recoil when the gun is fired. The details of the armament of the latest craft have been kept secret, but enough is known to justify the statement that the vessels are the most formidable type in existence.

KAISER AND SONS ARE QUARRELING VIOLENTLY NOW.

New York, Jan. 25.—A London Daily Express, dated Amsterdam, Sunday, to the New York Herald, says:

Neutral travellers returned from Germany state that a bitter conflict between the Kaiser and his two sons, the Crown Prince and Prince August Wilhelm, is being openly discussed in Berlin.

Numerous instructions given by the Crown Prince to generals under him have been vetoed by the Kaiser on the suggestion of Gen. von Falkenhayn, chief of the general staff.

When these orders were cancelled the Crown Prince passionately demanded explanations from his father. These were sternly refused, and after a stormy scene the Crown Prince left the Kaiser's headquarters, complaining that he was being treated like a boy.

It is anticipated in Berlin that the Crown Prince will be required to take a long rest and will soon return to the capital and join his brother, Prince August Wilhelm.

London, Jan. 25.—Anti-war riots approaching a revolution have occurred in Agram, capital of Austrian Croatia, according to mail advices from Vienna to-day. For three days the palace was besieged by rioters who succeeded in burning one wing of the building. Baron Ivan Skerlec, head of the Croatian Government, was badly wounded.

Similar disorders have occurred in Laibach, capital of Carniola, northwest of Trieste, according to mail advices.

Daily bread fights have occurred in Vienna. Half the bakers have been forced to close because of the lack of flour, and crowds of women and children stand in line for hours before other bakeries, snatching their loaves and hiding them beneath their cloaks for fear they will be stolen.

Trieste, on the Adriatic, is now being supplied with "war bread," the advices state. This is described as a "horrible mess," made of wheat, oats, rye, barley, ground beans, potatoes, chestnuts, bran and chopped straw, which sells for six cents a pound.

War News.

CHARGED WITH TREASON.

PRETORIA, To-Day. Pietre Grabler, member of Parliament of the Union of South Africa, and grandson of Paul Kruger, has been committed for trial on the charge of treason.

BRIDGE DYNAMITER.

VANCEBORO, To-Day. A man claimed to be a German officer was arrested on suspicion of having caused the explosion on the C. P. R. bridge and taken into custody on the American side of the line.

RUSSIAN CAPTURES.

PETROGRAD, To-Day. Seventy-eight officers and 4,065 of lower rank in the Austro-German army operating in the Carpathians were captured by Russians the past week, is officially announced.

FIGHTING AT FURNES.

LONDON, Feb. 2. The Daily Mail's correspondent telegraphs from Northern France that the Germans are continuing to bombard Furnes. The Allies' aviators discovered two carefully hidden German guns which had damaged the town, and their artillery at once destroyed them.

BECOMING MORE PRECARIOUS.

LONDON, Feb. 2. A correspondent telegraphs the Daily Telegraph from a point on the Dutch frontier: Information from Western Flanders indicates that the German hold on the Belgian coast line is becoming more and more precarious. Not only are the positions always subject to bombardment from warships off shore, but in the last few days the Allies on land have pursued active aggression, particularly in the neighborhood of Neuport to the district which is the extreme point in Belgium held by Germans. Good progress by the Allies is reported, as the result of severe fighting toward the end of last week. According to these accounts the principal attacks were concentrated between Neuport and Lombartzyde where the fighting, of which three separate bayonet charges were the main feature, resulted in the capture by the Allies of a strongly held position on the pines. There was desperate fighting on both sides. German casualties in the engagement included 400 dead and 400 prisoners.

CONTRABAND OF WAR.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. Britain has notified the United States, to-day, although not in an official form, that foodstuffs of any kind destined for Germany, Austria or Turkey, will be regarded as contraband of war.

EMPEROR WILLIAM ON A VISIT.

BERLIN, Feb. 2. Emperor William will leave Berlin tomorrow for Wilhelmshaven.

TRANSPORTATION OF BRITISH TROOPS.

BERLIN, Feb. 2. An official report issued to-day by the German navy department, calls attention to the extensive transportation of British troops to France, and says, we shall use every method of war at our disposal against them.

DYNAMITER CAPTURED.

VANCEBORO, Feb. 2. Wermer Van Horn is the name of the German arrested for dynamiting the C.P.R. bridge. He acknowledges having done the deed, saying his country is at war with Britain, and that Canada is a part of his enemy's country. As he was taken into custody in the State of Maine, it is believed he will be defended against extradition.

EARTHQUAKE IN YORKSHIRE.

LONDON, Feb. 2. Earthquakes occurred last night in number of districts in Yorkshire, the minor was killed and many had narrow escapes, owing to the shaking of coal in pits. In some cases the pits were rendered unworkable by the fall of coal.

TO TURKEY'S DEFENCE.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 2. German naval base have arrived at Mesopotamia on the Aegean Sea, to organize naval defense in that locality.

ITALIAN RESERVISTS.

LONDON, Feb. 2. Italian reservists living in England have been warned to prepare to return to a call to the colors.

MORE BARBARISM.

PARIS, Feb. 2. German submarine yesterday was an unsuccessful attempt to torpedo a British ship.
