Priest Died for Church.

Father d'Argent Suffered Horrible Mutilation and Death at Hands of Germans.

London, Feb. 26.—In a pastoral letter, Cardinal Mercier wrote: "A parish priest of Gelrode suffered, I believe, veritable martyrdom." Particulars of the death of this priest are published in The Tablet of the testimony of an eye-witness, Father Vertrucken, professor at the college of St. Stanislaus, Antwerp, who is now in London. His testimony is as follows:—

"On August 20th the Germans entered Gelrode. For no other reason save their pleasure, they shot several young men and women. Besides these two persons were severely injured by bullets. Father d'Argent took the unfortunate people in a cart to Aerschot, in which work of charity he was helped by my brother.

"While in the street of Aerschot his horse and cart were seized. He and the driver were made prisoners and after charges had been brought against them they were shut up in the cellar of the town hall for the night. Afterwards I saw Father d'Argent standing against the wall of a church. His hands and feet were bound with copper wire and he was forced to stand on tiptoe with his hands above his head. Owing to the blows he had already received his face looked blue and the blood dripped down to his bare feet. In that way he was for three hours subjected to the most scandalous treatment, of which I dare not here give particulars. He was mocked and laughed at by the soldiers. When they were tired of this, Father d'Argent was given two conditions to fulfill to obtain his release from torture. One was to abjure his faith as a Catholic; the other to cry 'Germany for ever!' Although repeatedly urged by the soldiers to consent, the priest always gave one answer—'No never!' He was then taken by the soldiers to a house about 200 yards distant from the church. He was led behind it and then killed with two rifle shots. The body was thrown into the river and found two days afterwards quite naked."

The German's English Dictionary.

One of the staff of No. 2 Canadian Hospital in France has been means of bringing to light a new document bearing on the war and Germany's preparedness for aggression. A German corporal wounded in the recent fight near La Bassée presented to the Rev. G. Anderson Wells, Church of England Army Chaplain at the hospital, a little red book entitled "Tornister Worterbuch Englisch" (meaning an English dictionary for the knapsack), and added that there had been issued to several other army corps similar dictionaries, not only in French, but in Russian.

The book appears to have been prepared for the use not of the German army as a whole, but of an expeditionary force especially designed to land on our shores. It contains over 4,000 words, more than half of which apply to naval and military operations, and includes a list, with pronunciation, of most points of military importance in the United Kingdom. The little work, which seems, from internal evidence, to have been published in 1912, is described by the special correspondent of the Glasgow Herald into whose possession it has come, as another example of German thoroughness and forethought, coupled with that cocksureness which has been followed by so many disappointments, and the contents of two chapters of phrases for invading troops, if they had come to the notice of any British publicist before August last, would have most probably precipitated the world's strife.

WHY GREECE DID NOT ENTER WAR.

London, March 17.—A Reuter despatch from Rome gives an interview which the correspondent of the Corriere Della Sera has had with M. Venizelos, the former Premier of Greece, in which M. Venizelos is quoted as saying that twice since the outbreak of the war the Allies have asked Greece to send men to help Serbia, but the attitude of Bulgaria prevented Greece from doing so.

When the operations against the Dardanelles began, the Allies semi-officially inquired whether the King was disposed to intervene at the Crown Council. M. Venizelos, who was then Premier, proposed that fifty thousand men should be sent to aid the Allies, and urged that in return Greece should obtain the vilayet of Smyrna.

Owing to objections which were immediately raised, M. Venizelos reduced his figures to fifteen thousand men and proposed co-operation of the Greek navy and the use of naval base. The entire proposal was rejected by the Crown Council, and M. Venizelos resigned.

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
