#### Germans and Irish Prisoners.

A.French Doctor's Story.

Remarkable details of a German attempt to induce Irish prisoners to form an Irish Brigade for service against Great Britain, says the "Daily Chronicle," are supplied by a French doctor, who has just returned after over six months internment. He writes:- Very peculiar were the manoeuvres tried amongst the Irish. German priests who knew English well were introduced. Their activities were not confined to religious ministrations; they were sent for a different kind of work. When the result of their labor seemed sufficiently advanced the following remarkable proclamation was issued to the prisoners.

CAMP OF LIMBURG IRISHMEN. Here is your chance for fighting for Ireland. You have fought for England, the hereditary enemy of your country. You have fought for Belgium and English interests, which concern you no more than the Fiji Islands. Now make up your minds to fight for your own land. With the yiew of assuring the independence of Ireland with the moral and material assistance of the German Government an Irish Brigade is being formed. The object of this Irish Brigade will be to fight only for the cause of Ireland. and will not in any way serve any German interests. The Irish Brigade will be formed and will fight solely under the Irish flag. The men will wear an Irish uniform. The Irish Brigade will be clothed, maintained, and fully equipped with arms and ammunition by the German Government. It will be quartered near Berlin and treated like the guests of the German Government. At the conclusion of the war the German Government undertakes to send every member of the Brigade who may desire it to the United States at its cost and with the necessary money to land. The Irish-Americans are collecting for the Brigade. The men who do not enlist in the Irish Brigade will be withdrawn from the Limburg Camp and dispersed in other camps. If you take any interest in the cause mentioned above, apply to the commander of your company. Join the Irish Brigade and gain the independence of Ireland. Remember Bachelor's Walk.

God save Ireland. Of all the 2,000 only three poor fellows were led astray. The others got wind of this and fell upon the culprits just as they were about to be secretly removed from the camp. When the doctor left the camp only eighteen had enlisted altogether, loafers or bad characters, over whose tent there waved in all its magnificence the green flag, with the golden harp of the Irish Brigade.-Cork Examiner. Aug. 24.

### **Dumba's Letter** on Munition Strikes.

New York, Aug. 20, 1915.

My Lord: Yesterday evening Consul General . Von Nuber received the inclosed aide memoire from the chief editor of the locally known paper Szabadsag, after a previous conference with him, and in pursuance of his proposals to arrange for strikes in the Bethlehem Schwab steel and munition war factory, and also in the Middle West.

Dr. Archibald, who is well known to Your Lordship, leaves to-day at twelve o'clock on board the Rotterdam for Berlin and Vienna. I take this rare and safe opportunity to warmly recommend the proposal to Your Lordship's favorable considera-

It is my impression that we can disorganize and hold up for months, if not entirely prevent, the manufacture of munitions in Bethlehem and the Middle West, which, in the opinion of the German Military Attache, is of great importance and amply outweighs the expenditure of money in-

But even if strikes don't come off, it is probable that we should extort. under the pressure of the crisis, more favorable conditions of labor for our poor, downtrodden fellow countrymen. In Bethlehem these white slaves are now working for twelve hours a day and seven days a week. All weak persons succumb and be-

come consumptives. So far as German workmen are found among the skilled hands, a means of living will be provided for

Besides this, a private German registry office has been established. which provide employment for persons who have voluntarily given up their places, and is already working well. They will also join, and the

widest support is assured me. I beg Your Excellency to be so good as to inform me with reference to this letter by wireless telegraphy, replying whether you agree.
