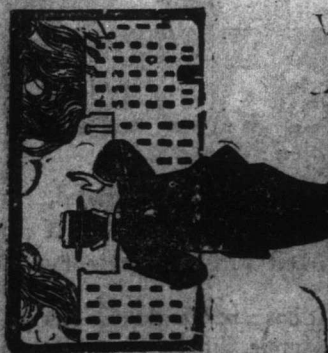

Civil Re-Establish- ment Committee.

Extensions Granted to Courses.
Hon. George Shea presided over the
regular meeting of the Civil Re-
Establishment Committee, which took
place yesterday afternoon. Some 32
cases were dealt with, and a number
of extensions granted to training
courses.

The Vocational Officer introduced
a number of requests from returned
men asking for loans to assist them
in different enterprises. This matter
is not within the scope of the Com-
mittee; but it has been forwarded to
the Government with certain recom-
mendations.

The Employment Report, submit-
ted by Capt. Leo Murphy, showed a
record week, positions having been
found for 41 men since May 1st, as
against 22 on the previous week. In
this connection the firms of Ander-
son, Reid Mtd. Co., Mangle, Contrac-
tor, and others cannot be forgotten
for their patriotic action in giving
preference, in each instance, to re-
turned veterans.

The Vocational Officer announced
that Miss Ina Abbott had been obli-
ged to resign her position as Teacher
at Jensen Camp, owing to illness.
Miss Abbott was a capable official
and the Committee regretted to hear
of her retirement.

The Land Settlement Scheme is be-
ing pushed with vigour. The Quali-
fication Board, over which Hon. Dr.
Campbell is Chairman, meets twice
weekly, and most of the applications
received have already been dealt
with.

The matter of occupational training
for invalids has received attention,
and Hon. J. M. Kent, with Dr. W. W.
Blackall and Miss Evelyn Smith have
the subject well in hand and its
organization is now fully completed.

A great deal of correspondence was
gone through and the session con-
cluded at a late hour.
