

Duty on Fresh Fish, ONE-CENT PER POUND UNDER NEW U.S. TARIFF.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The Administration permanent tariff bill was introduced today in the House of Representatives. Unofficial estimates placed the expected returns at seven hundred million dollars a year. The new bill removes many articles from the free list, although it leaves a large list free of duty, including paper, wool pulp, leather, harness and agricultural implements. It raises the duties on the great bulk of imports already being taxed. Finished lumber is kept on the free list. Shingles, however, were taxed.

Timber, hewn, 1/2 of one cent a cubic foot. Logs, fir, spruce, cedar or hemlock, \$1 a thousand feet. Logs, sawed boards and other forms of cedar, lignumvita and other cabinet woods, 15 per cent.

The agriculture products schedule in the bill as introduced includes: Fresh fish, 1 cent a pound; formerly free. Prepared salmon, 25 per cent; formerly free. Apples, 25 cents a bushel; formerly 10 cents.

Important items which remain on the free list include: Coal (from countries which impose no tariff on United States coal).

Spirits, wines and beverages: Liquors as defined by the National Prohibition Act will carry the following rate: Brandy and liquors, \$5 a gallon. Champagne, \$6 a gallon. Ale, porter, stout, \$1 a gallon. Ginger ale and soft drinks, 15 cents a gallon. Mineral waters, 10 cents a gallon.

Disabled Ship Reported.

The Furness Withy Co. received a wireless yesterday afternoon from the American steamer Chattanooga, stating the ship was bound to this port with her boilers out of order. The Chattanooga gave her position as latitude 43. 25. N., longitude 46. W. The ship is 2,256 tons net and is owned by the U.S. Shipping Board.

Home's Report.

The S.S. Home arrived at Humbermouth at 9.45 a.m., yesterday from the Labrador. The Captain has wired the following fishing report to the Reid Newfoundland Co.—"Made all ports of call to Battle Harbor. Good sign of fish on Labrador, also a good sign of fish from Port Saunders to Flower's Cove. Great reports 1500 qtls. landed to date. Traps are doing fair; not much with hook and line."

War Memorial Executive Meeting.

A well-attended meeting of the Executive of the War Memorial was held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade. The treasurer's account showed that \$9,930.75 in cash had been received to date and \$2,480 in subscriptions was promised by responsible persons making a total of \$11,410.75 for the two weeks the committee had been working. Subscriptions were continuing to come in daily and at the meeting Major March handed in a further amount of \$28.25 subscribed by the members of the Regiment on parade Sunday which brought their collection up to \$74.05. It was decided that arrangements would be made for the publication of the names of all shareholders in the Newfoundland War Memorial Company Limited, each month, but that the number of shares each subscriber had entered his name for would not be published.

Mr. H. A. Anderson reported that a sub-committee had been appointed to obtain designs and estimates on forms of Memorial and individual members of this committee had written to noted Memorial designers in England, Canada and the United States with the idea of having some definite suggestions to lay before those interested at an early date. The appointment of a Committee to take up the matter of outport subscription was left in the hands of Mr. D. M. Baird and Lady Crosbie and it is understood that this committee when appointed will make a strong effort to interest every town or settlement in the Island in the National Memorial.

It was decided that further immediate action would be taken to obtain the interest and financial support of everyone in the Newfoundland Memorial, and various suggestions were discussed. The general feeling was in favour of direct giving, rather than festivities or speculative methods. It was considered better to erect a less costly Memorial from funds subscribed directly for the purpose, than to raise them in any manner that might be considered not in harmony with the purpose—payment in some small way of Newfoundland's great debt of gratitude to her sacred and heroic dead.

Naval Prize Money.

A largely attended meeting of Naval Reservists was held in the G.W.V.A. Rooms last night, when the question of Prize Money was discussed. The Prime Minister's Report on the matter was read and resolutions were passed which will be acted upon shortly. From the Report of the Prime Minister it could be gathered that there was little hope of the Naval men obtaining the prize money they claim.

'Longshoremen Meet.

The L. S. P. U. held a meeting last night in the Union Hall when the matter of the proposed wage reduction, which was to have come into effect on July 1st, was discussed. Owing to the excessive duties imposed by the Government the cost of living has increased rather than declined, as had been anticipated when the recent strike was settled and the men had agreed to the July reduction. Consequently the Union felt that it could not now abide by their previous decision. This morning, as a protest against the 15 per cent. decrease, the men employed along the waterfront quit work and are now out on strike. A statement showing that the wage scale left to what it was all the winter. The employers on the other hand contend that the laborers had agreed to a 10 per cent. and a 15 per cent. decrease, and at a meeting held in the Board of Trade Rooms this phase of the matter was discussed. A statement showing that the cost of living has declined considerably despite the high tariff is being prepared and will be sent to the Union Executive this evening. A document supposed to be an agreement up to 1922 with the employers is causing much discussion amongst the laboring men, as it was said to contain the signature of an official of the Union, but the Union is not cognizant of any written agreement covering the period as mentioned in the document.
