Annual Statement. A Splendid Financial Showing for

The Province Imposes No Direct Taxes, but Has an Interest-Bearing Surplus of Over Five Millions.

Toronto, Dec. 15.-There was a large attendance in the Legislature yester-day, when Hon. Mr. Harcourt, treasurer of the province, rose to make his annual financial statement. The honmy Manning's list for next season are orable treasurer was warmly applauded. He first of all pointed out that the surplus was \$5,258,324.

The timber limits disposed of during the year realized an average of \$1,665 per mile. The Sandfield Macdonald administration had held four sales, one in each of the years of its term of office, and had realized an average of \$260 per mile. The average price realized by the Mowat administration in its various sales was \$1,225, or five times the average of the Sandfield Macdonald sales. With reference to the annuities and railway aid certificates, Mr. Harcourt pointed out that they were employed as a legitimate means for postponing the payment of a debt that was due. Their issuance did not add a dollar to the obligations of the people. Nor was the whole of their appropriations in aid of railways represented by the annuities and certificates. During the last two parliaments the sum of \$1,099,-732 had been paid out of the revenue, altogether outside the provision that had been made by means of the certificates and annuities. Coming to the succession duties, the treasurer made a powerful defense of them. The estimate for the year had been \$175,000.
The actual receipts up to the end of October had been \$96,376, but it was altogether likely that the amount estimated would be realized before the close of the year. One of the items mentioned, namely, the \$6,500,000 for railway aid, four times the amount of Sandfield Macdonald's surplus, had never been taken exception to, not even one item of it, by the honorable gentlemen opposite. Within four years they had spent \$2,-750,000 on the erection of public buildings, all of which had been paid out of the revenue, buildings which were urgently needed and were of the highest utility to the province. On the 1st of November they had to the credit of the province in the banks \$724,882, which included \$498,161 added to the surplus from the revenues of the year. Mr. Harcourt then dealt with the


