MTAIN FOUND TO BE LOCATED IN OUR TERRITORY.

A Slice of Valuable Mineral Territory Adjudged by Government Surveyors to Belong to Canada-A Country Rich in

Uncle Sam has just lost the biggest lump of land which he said he thought was in his possessions. No longer can the United States claim to hold the biggest mountain in North America. The tallest bit of territory this side the North Atlantic has been adjudged the property of Great Britain. Mount St. Elias, the snow-crowned monarch of the Alaskan Mountains, no longer stands upon American soil.

The members of the United States coast survey party sent this summer to confer with representatives of the State Department of England, with a view to effectually locating the boundary line of Alaska have returned to Washington. The division has been definitely fixed at the 141st meridian of longitude. Mount St. Elias stands just half a degree east of this, and, therefore, is within the British posses-

In 1867, when the United States bought the vast country of Alaska from Russia at a price of less than half a cent an acre, it was believed that the famous peak of



the Cordilleran Mountains was part of a job-lot. Although the land is barren and unproductive, it has a coastline of over eighteen thousand miles, which is more than all the rest of the United States put together can boast, and with pinnacle reaching nearer heaven than any other spot where the stars

and stripes might be planted, it was not thought a bad bargain. But ever since trouble has arisen with England as to liberty commenced. Now this is settled, mountain.

St. Elias is still very young, it may grow.

As a rule mountains on this continent
have a tenden y to go back upon the estimates of their altitudes made by early surveyors. Mount Hood, in Oregon, provides a case in point. It was originally set down as 17,000 feet in height, but by recent observers it has gradually been written down to 12,000. A farmer who lives at the foot of Mount Hood was lately much annoyed at the belittling of his pet earth-heap. He said that if scientific men kept pegging away at the mountain the summit would soon become nothing more than a hole in

the ground. Now that Uncle Sam has lost St. Elias he must drop his pride some 2,000 odd feet in the matter of mountains and fall back upon Mount Brown of the Rockies. Here he may whittle his stick at an altitude of 15,000 feet, and brag that he is 119 feet

above the tallest bit of all Europe.

The decision is one which will be approciated in British Columbia and will give her a greater coast line and more open ports than Port Simpson without going through Yankee territory.

A Canadian expert recently reported to the government that the Yukon country is rich with gold and that in time the interior will be of much commercial importance. It will now be more easily developed

as a British possession.
