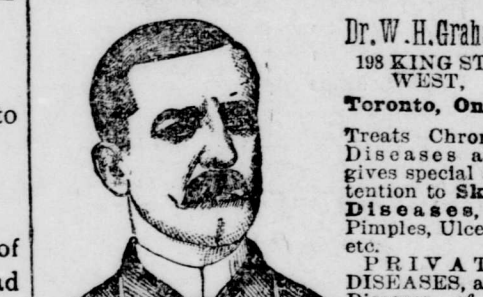

It Was a Hot Night

But the School Board Had Breezy Session.

The Kindergarten at Aberdeen School to be Enlarged.

Awarding of the Boyle Medal Referred to No. 1 Committee.

At last night's meeting of the Board of Education there were present: Dr. Campbell (chairman), Trustees Stevenson, Griffin, Dr. Teasdale, Keenleyside, Anderson, Bayly, Dr. Wilson, Buchner, Greenlee, Sanders, Burdick, Johnston, Logan and Murphy. The report of No. 2 committee was first dealt with, by request of Mr. Buchner. The first five clauses passed in silence, but clause No. 6 stirred up the board. It recommended that action be taken to cancel the leases of the rooms now occupied for kindergarten purposes in Colborne Street Methodist Church, St. George's and Waterloo street schools. As the new buildings are being completed there will be no further use for these rooms, and it was the general opinion of the board that notice should be given at once.

Dr. Teasdale asked if the new addition to the Aberdeen school would be sufficient accommodation for the pupils in that section.

Dr. Campbell—I think so. The Inspector informed me that it would be. Dr. Teasdale—Well, Mr. Chairman, if there is, it will be a bad give-away on the board, after we have been fighting for a six-roomed school south of the track.

After further discussion the clause passed.

The clause in the report asking the board to ratify the expenditure of \$476.95 on the new addition to Aberdeen kindergarten made more trouble.

Trustee Johnston moved that the clause be struck out, and Mr. Griffin seconded. Mr. Johnston thought \$100 was quite enough money to be spent on the school, and Mr. Griffin said it was more than the place was worth.

Mr. Anderson—The motion is out of order, because this board has made provision for the expenditure.

Dr. Campbell moved the motion out of order on the grounds stated by Mr. Anderson, saying that the board had set aside \$500 for the purpose of fixing up that school.

Another clause recommended the acceptance of Gould & Stratford's tender for side blackboards. It created a lengthy discussion, and before this was gotten through with the tenders submitted for the work had been brought down. Mr. Buchner's amendment proposed that the work be equally divided between R. Wilker and Gould & Stratford. In speaking to this, he said that he understood the slate blackboards to be the most durable, and thought, as they were cheaper than the putty composition boards, they should be chosen.

Mr. Greenlee said he wasn't in a position to vote on the question, and understood the inspector would have given some light on the matter, but he was not there.

Mr. Sanders explained that the inspector had given his opinion, which was in favor of slate boards. Mr. Buchner wanted the tenders brought down. Mr. Stevenson was also anxious to have them, and the secretary went and got them.

Dr. Campbell thought the board concerned themselves too much about little matters and went to extremes.

An amendment to the amendment was made by Mr. Sanders to refer the whole matter back to the committee for further consideration.

Mr. Buchner's motion to divide the work between Gould & Stratford and R. Wilker carried by a vote of 7 to 5.

Dr. Campbell was appealed to because he was not at voting. He excused Mr. Griffin, because he did not believe in any of the boards, and another vote was taken, in which other members did not take any part. Mr. Sanders wished to be excused also.

Dr. Campbell—Well, gentlemen, I am going to do this whole business over again. You don't seem to know where you are at.

The amendment to refer the matter back was put and carried.

Mr. Buchner—Mr. Chairman, I want that reconsidered, because you have declared it carried that the work should be divided, and you cannot go back on it.

If he had known that the chairman was going to cut the thing so short, he would have appealed against his ruling.

Dr. Wilson moved to have the name of Sifton & Co. substituted for that of Anderson & Co., as there was a difference of \$2.70 in the price of pens.

Curried.

The report was then moved for adoption as amended, but just here Mr. Buchner moved that the name of R. Wilker be substituted for that of Anderson & Stratford. The chairman gave the mover a significant look, and said: "Now, look here; we have had enough of these little tricks, and I think you had better apologize at once."

Mr. Buchner pleaded innocence, and the matter went through, the report being adopted.

Nearly the whole of the Inspector's report, which recommended many changes in the teaching staff, was referred back for further investigation. Messrs. Wilson, Buchanan, Sanders and Griffin figured in the discussion.

Mr. Buchner wanted to know if the inspector had taken into consideration the distances these teachers lived from the school to which the inspector would assign them.

Dr. Campbell said the object of the inspector was not to give the teachers a nice job, but get the best possible results.

Mr. Keenleyside moved that the secretary be given two weeks' holidays, the board to name the time. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Sanders and Mr. Buchner the matter of awarding the Boyle memorial was referred to No. 1 committee to investigate.

Mr. Graham, principal of the Simcoe street school, recommended that the following teachers, who acted on the teaching staff of the Model School last year, be reappointed: Miss C. A. Campbell, Miss M. Skelton, Miss M. McDonnell, Miss T. Walton, Miss M. Fleming, Miss A. D. Luke, Miss D. Rogers, Miss E. Anundson, Miss N. Morris.

Applications were received from W. A. McGrimmon and A. E. Hamilton for the position of drill instructor. No. 1.

Applications for position on the teaching staff were received as follows: C. J. Bradley, W. W. Ireland, Jessie R. Howie, Louise Gahan, Grace Claypole, Helen Angus, Alice Walker, Ethel A. Ballew, Rena M. Black, No. 1.

Applications for position of janitor were received from James Jackson, C. O. Stapleton, W. M. Finch and T. H. Kinsella. No. 1.

The following motion was made by Mr. Logan: "That all teachers making application for positions on the staff undergo a medical examination, and that they be charged \$1. If they don't pass, the board to pay the dollar."

benefit. In Toronto they had made a similar move. He said it was only a matter of time when the matter would be taken up more extensively.

Mr. Greenlee didn't think the people in Toronto had made any such move. What was the use of it? There were children who went to school afflicted with disease, and the teacher had to stand it.

Mr. Murphy said that even if this were passed, they could not dispose of a teacher on these grounds. If they wished to discharge a teacher who was unhealthy, they would have to find some other pretext, because there was no act authorizing school boards to do anything of the kind.

Mr. Logan—I have heard some pretty strong statements about the obnoxious breath of some of the teachers.

Dr. Campbell—That is only their teeth, and the trustees have no right to get so close to the teachers.

Mr. Anderson spoke of the manner in which certain schools were overcrowded on account of non-resident pupils, and moved to amend section 41: "That hereafter no pupil be allowed to attend any school out of the district in which he lived, unless personal application be made to No. 1 committee, and then only on a two-third vote." He said a great many of the pupils had been given authority to attend other schools by the school trustees, and this plan would put a stop to this kind of thing.

No. 1 committee was empowered to secure a room for the Model School term.
