Caracas, Venezuela, June 29.-The resignation of the Cabinet created a Guest of the Prince resignation of the Cabinet created a crisis not only on the administration of the government, but also among the people. Excitement runs high, the sensational action of the ministry beng the paramount topic of discussion. President Crespo was unable to harmonize the differences in his official family over the Guiana boundary arbitration treaty. The element that con-tended that the provisions of that agreement ignored the sovereignty of Venezuela is stipulating that Great Britain and the United States only, and not Venezuela also, name the members of the tribunal of arbitration, has continued implacable.

TALK OF A BIG STRIKE

Affecting Five States and Involving Nearly 125,000 Miners.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 29.—Notwith-standing the denials of the local offi-cials of the Miners' Association, an afternoon paper publishes a long ar-ticle in effect that the national officers of the union will issue orders tomorrow for a strike in five states on Saturday Nearly 125,000 men, it is said, will b engaged in this great conflict, and the battlefield will cover the bituminous coal centers of Indiana, Illinois, West Virginia and Western Pennsylvania. Pittsburg, Pa., June 29.—Patrick Do-an, president of the Pittsburg district emphatically disclaims any knowledge of the proposed strike.


