—The street railway company had a
number of teams and men carting snow
from several of the streets yesterday. It
may have an accident.

—The public are asked to notice that

been postponed until next Monday night.

—Mr. James Begg, sen., of York street
east, fell on a water tap on Saturday and
broke a rib. He was engaged fixing the
roof of his house, when he missed his
footing on the ladder.

—The storm of Sunday left snow drifts
several feet deep on the Wharncliffe road,
London West. The railway train was
buried and it took a large gang of men
nearly all yesterday to open the way for
the traffic.
