WHAT CANADA CAN DO. It May Happen If the Corliss Immigration Bill Becomes Law.

Detroit, Feb. 12.-It was reported among shipping men in Windsor this morning that, in case the Corliss Immigration Bill becomes law, the Canadian Government will compel every American ship passing through any Canadian canal to land its crew at the entrance of the canal, hire a Canadian crew to take the vessel through, and oblige the American crew to travel overland to the other end of the canal.
