Macy & Pendleton, New York, writ ing on Friday, says: Beerbohm estimates Great Britain will want 180,000, 000 bushels, France 48,000,000, Germany, Belgium and Holland 88,000,000, Italy, 27,000,000, Spain and other smaller countries, 36,000,000, making a total 380,000,000 bushels. The extra amount needed by Germany and France appears about 50,000,000 bushels, and are the only significant items in the report. It indicates an additional call upon American granaries at a time when public stores are practically empty. Thus far the farmers do not sell freely and speculation continues to grow. 
