TORONTO, May 16—11 p.m.—The depression which was over the lake region and Ohio Valley yesterday has moved very slowly and has developed into a severe storm, the center of which is now near Buffalo. Rain has prevailed throughout Ontario and parts of Quebec to-day, with the heaviest fall near Lake Ontario. In the Northwest the weather has been fine and warm. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 38°—54°; Calgary, 48°—76°; Edmonton, 50°—76°; Prince Albert, 36°—76°; Qu'Appelle, 64°—70°; Winnipeg, 38°—70°; Toronto, 46°—59°; Montreal, 44°—69°; Quebec, 40°—52°; Halifax, 42°—62°.

—Mr. S. Worth, of this city, presided at the opening session of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, now in convention at Toronto.

—Mrs. Taylor, who has been visiting her daughter, Mrs. John Roberts, left yesterday for Pittsburgh, Pa., accompanied by the latter.

—A Petrolia dispatch says that J. E. Boosey, grocer, has assigned to Mr. Alfred Robinson, London. Liabilities at present unknown.

—Mr. J. H. Thomson, the L. and P. S. R. agent at St. Thomas, has resigned his position, as his duties are performed by the M. C. R. agent there.

—The City of London, Capt. Foster's steamer, is being fitted for the season's work. Her initial trip will probably be made on the Queen's Birthday.

—Messrs. W. White and D. M. Kenney, of this city, are the delegates from the local branch to the meeting of the National Telegraphers' Association at Toronto.

—The Ladies' Aid of the Byron Methodist Church will hold a musical and literary entertainment on Wednesday, May 24. The North street male quartet will furnish music.

—Mr. Wm. Skellett, who formerly carried on a butcher trade on Richmond street, died recently at Deland, Fla. A wife and child are left to mourn the loss. Interment will take place in this city.

—Rev. E. B. Lancelley, of Ridgeway, late of this city, will be tendered an invitation to accept the pastorate of the Central Methodist Church, St. Thomas, at the close of Rev. Dr. Pascoe's term in June, 1894.

—The adjourned meeting of the finance committee to inquire into the charges against Police Court Clerk Keary was adjourned indefinitely last evening on account of the absence of a number of the aldermen in Toronto.

—A young Englishman named Harold Wadman was arrested yesterday on a charge of non-payment of board bill, preferred by E. C. Brown, Park avenue. It is said that the young man represented himself as agent for a big millinery firm.

—An exciting game of basketball was played last evening in the Y. M. C. R. gymnasium, where Messrs. W. Wilson, R. Schuber, C. R. Sayer and H. C. Sreaton defeated Messrs. T. Evans, Bart Howard, R. Kirkpatrick and W. Gunn by a score of 7 to 2 goals.

—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Western Ontario Society, held yesterday at Victoria Hall, the Executive Committee for the year was appointed as follows: Right Rev. Bishop Baldwin, Rev. Dr. Sanderson, Mr. G. A. Somerville, Rev. Robert Aylward and Mr. John Cameron.

—The expedition to Detroit via the Grand Trunk Railway Quebec branch, under the auspices of the Grand Trunk Railway, A. O. F., should be patronized by citizens who appreciate a good benevolent society. The flyer will leave London at 6:40 a.m., arriving in Detroit at 10 a.m. Tickets good for two days, return either via Windsor or the great St. Clair tunnel.

—Dr. Mothersill, of Port Stanley, has lost his fine chestnut horse. The animal took flight Monday, ran down the east side of the creek, jumped into the harbor south of Brown's fish house, and never came back. Later, Brown Bros., who were getting ready to go and lift fish, got him out on the bank dead, and took the harness off. The doctor's loss is \$150.

—A copy of the council resolution respecting the school board estimates was received by Secretary McElhennan yesterday. Mr. McElhennan replied that he had been instructed to state that the final estimates of the board had been transmitted. He also stated that the chairman had no intention of calling a special meeting to reconsider unless required to do so by a properly signed requisition.

—Before the traveling man has left his hotel the newspaper advertisement has had an interview with the purchaser. The buyer may have been out of town that day, but somebody's newspaper advertisement was in his pocket. The country dealer may be located much "out of the way," but the newspaper gets there, and gets attention. The canvasser may ring in vain, but the housekeeper is always "at home" to her favorite newspaper.

—Like every other business theatrical affairs are gradually getting into the hands of a very few of the great magnates in the business. Mr. C. J. Whitney, of Detroit, has secured the Lyceum Theater, of that city, for a term of years, which gives him the absolute control of every theater in Detroit, viz., the Detroit Opera House, the Lyceum and the Grand Opera House. Besides Lyceum and the two theaters in Toronto, the Grand Opera House and the Academy of Music. One in Buffalo, one in Cleveland, one in Cincinnati, one in Toledo, one in Grand Rapids, one in London, Hamilton and Woodstock, and negotiating for several others in Toronto and Windsor.

Gone Out of Business.

at the Grand Trunk shops at Battle Creek burn oil instead of coal, and they find it a great saving in labor and cost of fuel.

Twelve years ago the C. and G. T. only had 22 engines running out from their round house in Port Huron. Now they have over 80, and this number is increasing constantly.

The weight was dangled from one of the horses, and as it passed the wagon on which the boy was seated it struck the wheel or hub. From there it bounced and hit the lad just above the knee, breaking the thigh bone. Dr. Piper was immediately summoned and the fracture reduced. THE POLICE COURT.

Minor Cases Before the Magistrate—A Fine Distinction.

The docket at the Police Court this morning was small.

John Bycott was fined \$2 for driving a horse immediately on Talbot street.

William Boyd appeared on a charge of drunkenness and vagrancy. His account of himself was not entirely satisfactory, and he was remanded until Monday pending investigation into his antecedents.

John Beddick, accused of permitting his cattle to roam at large, was discharged.

Thomas Broughton, George Griffin and Samuel Turner, all merchants on Talbot street, were arraigned for littering the sidewalk with various assortments of merchandise.

When Mr. Turner put in an appearance the magistrate said: "You are charged with obstructing the street."

"That was not what I was summoned for," responded the accused, with a twinkle in his eye.

"What were you summoned for, then?" continued the magistrate, not in the least perturbed.

"I was summoned for obstructing the sidewalk," maintained Mr. Turner, firmly.

Mr. Parke could not see the difference, as the sidewalk was part of the thoroughfare, and he suspended sentence on all three.

C. H. Wellsman was accused by Edward C. Brown, 424 Park avenue, with obtaining board under false pretences. The accusation was fully substantiated by several witnesses, and the case was referred to the first court of competent jurisdiction.

Ike Weir, the prize fighter, has been arrested in Boston for knocking a man down and breaking his leg.

The official conduct of W. E. Simonds, late U. S. commissioner of patents, has been under investigation, and it is understood that facts damaging to his reputation have come to light.

In an altercation between Bernard Cohn and James Burns on Butler street, Port Huron, on Monday, Burns was knocked into a window, cutting a four-inch gash in his neck. He is in a critical condition.

The bicycle relay race run from Columbus, Ohio, to Portsmouth, a distance of 100 miles, was made on Tuesday in 6 hours and 49 minutes over a very heavy road and in the face of strong wind and rain.

THE CHINESE MAY STAY.

For lack of funds to enact the Exclusion Law.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 16.—At the Cabinet meeting to-day, with a full attendance, the Chinese question as complicated by yesterday's decision of the Supreme Court was discussed from every point of view, and it is understood that the conclusion reached was that the law could not be enforced for the reason that there was no money available for that purpose. The act only carries an appropriation of \$100,000, and not more than \$25,000 of that sum remains, with some bills still unadmitted. To deport all Chinese men who have not complied with the law would cost more than \$6,000,000.

Under the circumstances it was understood that nothing could be done, and it is said there is little if any probability of the Government making any immediate effort to put the law into effect.
