Toronto, July 16 .- A most important Toronto, July 16.—A most important conference was begun this morning between the convention of the iron molders of North America and C. H. Castle and D. McAfee of Quincy, Ill.; J. Dwyer, of Detroit; D. W. Pick, of Rochester; I. J. Hogan, of Chicago, and other representatives of the Stove Manufacturers' Association respecting Manufacturers' Association respecting the apprenticeship ratio. The relations between the manufacturers and the men have been of the most cordial nature, and for tweive years there has been no strife in any of the union shops in the United States. Molders have become very scarce under the union regulation limiting the number of apprentices to one for every eight journeymen, and the employers urged the union today to agree to the ratio of one in six. SOFT COAL MINERS. Indianapolis, July 16.—The national convention of the United Mine We kers will assemble here tomorrow discuss the advisability of calling a strike to aid the anthracite men, who have been out in the east for several weeks. The action of the convention is uncertain, although the situation tonight indicates that there will be no walk-out of the soft coal men. If President Mitchell would declare that some sort of the soft coal men. his personal preferences, it would not be difficult to foretell the outcome. Curran, of Wilkesbarre, Pa., who called on President Baer at Philadelphia on Monday, was so much discouraged with the result that he will make no further attempts at settlement, and will not try to see any of the other operators. President Fowler, of the New York, Ontario & Western, said: "There will be no conces-sions on the part of the presidents of any kind or description. From a patriotic standpoint, as well as from the Christian, it is of importance that we should learn all that is possible of the inhabitants of India. The Fleming H. Revell Company have issued lately a book by Norman Russell, a missionary who has labored for some years under the Presbyterian Church of Canada in Central India.

"Village Work in India," may be divided fairly enough into two parts, one of which gives the experiences of the author in pursuing his appointed work in the villages of that strange land, and the other is a plea in favor of evangelistic work among the natives. The difficulties in the way of Christianizing the people are many, and as occasionally stated would seem insurmountable, but on the other hand, instances are given which would in-dicate that notwithstanding all the barriers of caste, idolatry and poverty, those to whom the Christian missionary speaks are open to the sweet influences of the story of Jesus Christ and his love for men. It is the same India with which so many of Rudyard Kipling's stories deal, but from a different standpoint, and while there is nothing of Kipling's genius flashing from these pages, yet the very simplicity of the tale has its own fascination, and the book is full of interest, especially to all who seek to keep in touch with the progress of the Christian Church in foreign lands. Fiscal Year's Figures Likely to Exceed \$400,000,000.

Record of the Best Year Under Conservative Regime Will Doubtless Be Surpassed.

Ottawa, July 17 .- The trade returns of Canada for the fiscal year ending June 30 have not yet been compiled, but when the compilation is completed our aggregate foreign trade will probably be found to have reached \$400,-000,000, and perhaps an even larger amount.

Our total trade with Australia up t May 31 was \$2,480,607, of which \$2,344,-289 were exports. For the whole of 1901 our trade with amounted to \$2,737,872, of which \$2,311,-405 was export. In the latter period all the Australasian colonies are included. From British Africa we in 1901 imported \$90,687 worth of goods for consumption, and exported \$1,086,965 worth. During the eleven months of the last fiscal year we imported \$15,808 worth, all free goods, and exported produce to the value of \$3,548,513.

WITH THE UNITED STATES. From the United States during the eleven months' period our imports for consumption were \$107,572,987, of which \$54,041,713 were free goods. Our ports totalled \$61,165,327, of which \$56,-953,105 was domestic produce. For the twelve months of 1901 our total imports lightful boat excursion to the St. Clair for consumption from the United States were \$107,149,325, of which a little less than one-half were free goods. Our exports to the United States during the same period totalled \$70,406,841, all but two and a half millions being domestic produce.

WITH GERMANY.

From Germany our imports for consumption during the eleven months were \$9,485,042, and during the previous year \$7,020,100, showing an increase of \$2,464,942. Our exports for the same periods were \$2,400,000 and \$2,141,552, or an apparent gain of \$258,449 in favor of the eleven months of 1902. The increase was really in foreign produce sent from Canada, as the exports of domestic goods show a decline of \$175,-

Our imports for consumption from France reached a value of\$6,048,329 during the eleven months referred to, and our exports to \$1,244,699. In 1901 our imports were \$5,397,793, and our exports \$1,581,351.
