Roosevelt's Recent Decision.

New York, Feb. 24.-Henry Clews & Co.'s circular of Feb. 22, says: "The action of the administration againt the Northern Securities Company was a sharp blow to the stock market, and will be likely to deprive it of much of the support given upon the expectation that the merger would be sustained in the courts. As other important mergers than the Northern Pacific and Great Northern were under way, and would undoubtedly have been carried through in event of a favorable decithe various bankers' plans for combination will meet with much delay if not final defeat, depriving the market of one of its recent supports. It is not to be supposed, however, that these plans will be quietly aban-The case will be stubbornly contested in the courts; and, if this method of controlling competition or giving community of interest some tangible form through security-holding companies is not successful, other means will unquestionably be attempted. It is far better, therefore, that the uncertainty should be settled before the creation is ventured of a vast mass of securities whose legal status could be upset after they had been distributed among the public.

"The market will require some time to recuperate from disappointment over the Northern Securities developments. Considerable liquidation has resulted and more may follow, as large quantities of stocks have been held in anticipation of a favorable decision. The outlook now is for a prolonged contest between legal giants. The issues are finely drawn, and no one can foresee the final decision of the Supreme Court, which it may be months and perhaps years in rendering. Stocks will now have to sell more closely on their merits, and holders must congratulate themselves that their value is now dependent upon present national prosperity and not upon indefinite 'community-of-interest" fictions."


