The board thought they should go slowly in this matter and decided to grant the companies 50 per cent of the value of he machinery which had already been completed and removed to Springbank. The company offered to finish installng the machinery, but the offer was not accepted, as the engineer said that it could hardly be put in under the present conditions of the weather. Messrs. George White & Sons noti-fied the board that they had taken

possession of the Hilliard mill on Ridout street and would pay the water rates past a certain time. D. S. Perrin & Co. asked the board for a three-inch meter to be used when their new building is completed.

The request was granted. Those present were Chairman Jones, Commissioner J. W. Jones, the mayor, Secretary Ellwood and Engineer Moore.
