his wearing apparel, and with a few hand-picked words, presented the cane to Mr. Cox.

He spoke of the excellent treatment accorded the Buffalo Old Boys during their stay in London, and they would all remember the pleasant time had. Johnny Cox attempted to reply, but all he could say was that he was happy, and he thanked the boys for their kindness.

Then the remaining features of the degree were performed, and the whole crowd escorted the Buffalo boys to the depot, where they entrained for home.

Mr. Cox says the degree is worth the money. It was also conferred upon others, but no umbrellas went with it. It was not raining.

C. P. R. Is Replacing the Machinists

Montreal, Aug. 7.—The Canadian Pacific has not lost any time in its effort to replace its striking mechanics in this city. Yesterday twenty men were taken on at the Angus shops, and today 75 more reported for duty. These are nearly all English-speaking men and are principally car and blacksmith men. A large number of for-

eigners have applied for work, but comparatively few of them came up to the standard required. So far the work has gone along without incident, and despite the men who are taking the places of the strikers, the men's committee claim to be well satisfied with the progress of the strike. The officials of the C. P. R. are not communicative on the matter.

BIG CROWD WAS HANDLED SPLENDIDLY

Pere Marquette Railway and Southwestern Traction Officials Were Most Attentive.

He was thought at first that he had sustained more serious injuries, as he was unconscious when found. He received a number of painful bruises and a swelling up, but otherwise he was unharmed. He is now in the Victoria Hospital and is resting easily.

Death of Miss McMillan. An old and esteemed resident of Westminster died this morning at the family residence, lot 23, concession 7, in the person of Miss Isabel Milne. Miss Milne was 77 years old and had lived in Westminster for many years. She is survived by two brothers, James and Robert W., of Westminster, and one sister, Mrs. Alex. Laidlaw, of Yarmouth. The funeral will be held on Monday morning at St. Peter's Cathedral, interment being made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

High School Cadets. Words of commendation are heard everywhere regarding the soldierly appearance and splendid deportment of the Collegiate Cadets at the Mardi Gras pageant. The corps acted as escort to the queen of the carnival and covered themselves with glory. Capt. The Late W. T. Cater. After an illness extending over three years, Mr. Wilfred George Cater, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Cater, passed away at his parents' residence, 556 Colborne street, at midnight on Aug. 5. Previous to his illness he was a telegrapher in local offices, where he was very highly esteemed by the staffs and all with whom he came in contact. Two years ago he was appointed manager of the C. P. R. office at Port Arthur, where he was hoped he would improve in health, but he gradually grew worse and had to resign. He made many friends while there and was highly respected. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World. Besides his wife he leaves his father and mother and two sisters, Mrs. L. H. Moore, 430 Pall Mall street, and Miss Beryl at home.

PERSONAL BETS ARE NOT CRIME

Judge Gaynor Decides New Law Applies Only to Professional Gamblers.

New York, Aug. 6.—Justice Gaynor, of the appellate division of the supreme court in Kings County today decided that the new anti-gambling law in its way interferes with the personal liberty of the people, and that it is no crime to record a bet unless the transaction is made by a bookmaker or one in the business of accepting bets.

The law has never descended to the extent of thrusting its nose into the personal affairs of men and women. The decision is of wide interest—it permits men to bet on race horses of will, or in fact any game of chance, and lifts the stigma of crime off euche or whist parties when played for prizes.

Box of Golf Balls. The decision was rendered in the case of George Sterling, who was arrested at Garden City after making and recording a bet of a box of golf balls with Izzy Hamm, Sterling appealed to the supreme court on a writ of habeas corpus and the argument was heard by Justice Gaynor.

"The charge against the relator," said Justice Gaynor, "is the violation of section No. 351 in wagering a box of golf balls on a game of golf and recording the bet. This was no crime. The law has never descended to the extent of thrusting its nose into the personal affairs of men and women."

"Those who try to make out that it has only tried to create a disrespect for it."

Public Opinion Necessary. "No law can be enforced except by public opinion, and wise legislators never pass a law which lacks public opinion in its favor. Such laws are dead letters, except as they are stirred up from time to time by a few among us who delight in meddling with the conduct of others, or to levy blackmail."

"An ordinary bet is not a crime, whether made in your parlor or on golf links or a race track; nor in the making of a note or memorandum thereof, but if you hold yourself out to bet with all comers or generally become the general recorder of such bets between others, you are guilty of a crime."

Principal Cummings, Agricultural College, conducted an excursion to Penny Mountain in the afternoon, where the students had an opportunity of seeing these educational principles reduced to practice, while enjoying a social and recreative outing.

In a short address the superintendent pointed out the necessity for and the superlative value of such exercises.

The parade will start at 8:30 this evening from the city hall. Rowdiness will not, however, be tolerated. It is possible for the merry-makers to enjoy and give enjoyment without making themselves offensive.

MR. DEARNESS IN N. S.
Noted Educationist Conducting Summer School at Truro.

The Halifax Chronicle says of a noted Londoner:

The Summer School of Science at Truro has an attendance of about 80 students of more than average ability. It is under the direction of Mr. John Dearness, vice-principal of the Normal School of London, Ont., assisted by the staff of the Normal School and of the School of Agriculture. As an educationist Mr. Dearness has few equals in America. He is the author of a valuable text book on nature study.

The school was visited on Friday by the superintendent of education, who heard some of the lectures, and inspected the military drill by Sgt. Armitage.

In his lecture on plant study, Mr. Dearness emphasized the importance of adopting the subject matter of education to practical ends, of studying plants in their natural environment and life processes, instead of as dried specimens to be dissected or studied from books, the function of doing as developing efficiency. He showed the students how to make and utilize home-made apparatus, etc.
