C. W. BENNETT SELLS

(Continued From Page One.)

Pleasant Relations.

Mr. Bennett was very enthusiastic regarding the pleasant relationship existing between himself and his associate directors, and the loyalty of his staff and assistants, including his managers and New York representatives, and the kind treatment he had received generally from the press and the theatre-going public, and said he was glad of an opportunity of expressing his appreciation.

He dwelt upon his early struggles here, and stated that there would always be a soft spot in his heart for "dear old London," as he put it, where he had spent many happy days, and for all the towns in Canada which he had invaded with vaudeville. Nearly everybody is familiar with Mr. Bennett's rapid and deserving rise in his business, and knows how he started a complete stranger here with the old London Opera House, in a small way, a few years ago, and how he developed his business into one of the largest and best-paying theatrical propositions in America, with theatres running into the aggregate cost of hundreds of thousands of dollars, extending all over Canada. How he became a power among the big theatrical men in the United States, even to such an extent that he participated in all the big meetings of the theatrical magnates held in the United States. No doubt he did his share toward making vaudeville what it is today. On the strength of his personality and strict attention to business he was able to enlist the financial support and assistance of some of the cleverest and most prominent financial men in the Dominion, making the Bennett Company the powerful financial organization it is.

It is said that this company is one of the few in America which has made money during the last two years, which, from a theatrical standpoint, have been the worst, so old theatrical men say, in twenty years, for the reason that while "hard times" hit the business as much, if not more, than any other line, the salaries of actors have been going up to unheard-of figures, being even worse off, the managers than the so-called "hard times." It is admitted among the profession that the big theatrical men in the United States never woke up to the theatrical possibilities in Canada in their true light until Mr. Bennett and his company established their circuit of theatres in the various Canadian cities. Since then it is understood that overtures have been made to the Bennett Theatrical Company by theatrical magnates in the United States to buy the circuit, but they were told, so the rumor goes, "that it was not for sale," but as to this, Mr. Bennett had nothing to say.

Indians Murder A Canadian Family

Montreal, July 12.—A gruesome confession arrived here by the Grand Trunk this morning from the west, bringing details of a tragedy of a particularly revolting nature. Out in Rudolph, South Dakota, lived a family of the name of Christie, formerly of St. Stephens, New Brunswick, a husband, his wife and daughter. Christie pursued the business of a grain buyer, and had frequent dealings with the Indians in the district. Whether through some haggle over the price or other cause is not known, but an attack was organized on the Christie house and the mother and daughter shot dead. The father appears to have put up a fight for his life, but his skull was fractured. He was 57 years of age. The bodies leave here for New Brunswick tonight.

"Bobs" Bill Sidetracked By Lords

London, July 13.—The House of Lords tonight, by a vote of 123 to 103, decided not to proceed with the national service bill, which Lord Roberts introduced in the House yesterday. This bill provides for the compulsory service in the territorial army of all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 30.

Boy Aeronaut Sails Over Gotham

Hackensack, N. J., July 13.—Frank W. Goodale, the boy aeronaut, sailed across the Hudson and around a part of New York today.

In a talk about his trip this evening Goodale remarked: "The first moment the air is still I'll float over to New York again and surprise some people."

Goodale has twice crossed the Hudson River. Once he circled Grant's tomb and the action time he passed down Broadway as far as Eighth street. Not a breath of air stirred when the young aeronaut put his nose out of his tent near the balloon at 8 o'clock this morning and started on his flight. He went straight across the

North Buxton Death A Mystery

Chatham, July 14.—Mrs. Edison, wife of Rev. Mr. Edison, a colored preacher at North Buxton, died suddenly on Sunday night, and following an inquest held yesterday afternoon by Coroner Bray, the stomach of the deceased was sent to Toronto for analysis.

Dr. Bell, of Merlin, has been treating the woman for stomach trouble for two weeks, and last called on Wednesday. She then did not appear to be seriously ill. On Sunday, however, he happened to call and found the woman in a dying condition. A FIGHT TO FINISH SAYS PRESIDENT ROSS

Head of Coal Company Says It Will Not Meet Representatives of the Union.

Montreal, July 13.—Mr. James Ross, president of the Dominion Coal Company, who is at Glace Bay, wired to Montreal tonight that the company would never meet representatives of the United Mine Workers. This means that the strike will be fought by the company to the bitter end.

Ottawa, July 13.—The department of labor today gave out the following official definition of its attitude:

"The dispute at Glace Bay between certain employees of the Dominion Coal Company, members of a local union of the United Mine Workers of America, and the said company, has already been the subject of Government intervention, by reference under the industrial disputes investigation act, and the report of the board appointed has been given to the public in accordance with the provisions of the act."

OFF TO CHICAGO AS GINGLES' WITNESS

Bellefonte, July 13.—Mr. Charles Furthner, of Chicago, associate in the state attorney's office of that city, arrived here yesterday, and as a result of his visit Dr. Gibson, D. Thornton and E. McCormick, all of this city, left for Chicago this morning as witnesses in the celebrated case of Ella Gingles, on trial there charged with theft. The accused was at one time an employee of Mr. Thornton, and while in Bellefonte was in trouble. The case is exciting much interest here.

BONUS TERM MUST PAY THE SCHOOL TAX

Toronto, July 13.—That no municipality may bonus a manufacturing company by exempting it from the payment of school taxes is the effect of a judgment delivered at Osgoode Hall today.

The action was that of James Pringle, a ratepayer of Stratford, who brought suit to compel the town of Stratford to collect school taxes from the White Packing Company, and the George McLaughlin Furniture Company. According to the judgment the town must collect school taxes from the firms in question in future.

Pringle also wished to have back taxes collected. The judge refused to direct this, but says that Pringle may appeal on that point.

GETTING READY FOR THE BIG GUNS

Preparations at Petawawa for the Annual Training.

Ottawa, July 13.—Major Maunsell, director of engineers' service of the militia department, left for Petawawa on Saturday, where he will be present at the annual training, but more especially to complete the drainage system of the camp. The work on these drains is nearly completed, and Major Maunsell is anxious to have the system working before any of the militia batteries arrive, as an extra precaution against disease in the camp this summer.

THIRTEEN IN HOUSE ELEVEN BOLTS HIT

Sante Fe, Mexico, July 13.—News of a remarkable play of a lightning storm on Sunday has just reached here. During a thunderstorm lightning struck the house of W. E. Rail, a homesteader, and H. N. Rutherford, who with his family was at the Rail house, was killed.

Following this interval of one minute eleven more bolts struck the house, each shocking an occupant, though not fatally. There were thirteen persons in the house at the time of the storm. The last stroke set the house on fire, but the flames were extinguished by Mrs. Hall with buckets of water.

PORTERAGE CHARGES.

Montreal, Que., July 13.—The porters charges levied by steamship companies at the port of Montreal for the first time this year are to be modified. The Canadian Pacific and Dominion Lines have taken the initiative and have issued a circular announcing that all contracts made prior to May 23 will be exempt from the special porters charge of 25 cents per ton, but exemption must be claimed by consignee before July 24. This means that the bulk of the cargoes this summer will escape the porters charge.

GAVE INDIAN BOOZE.

Brandon, July 13.—George Grooms in the police court this morning pleaded guilty to the charge of supplying liquor to Peter Hill, an Indian, and was fined \$50. A fine of \$25 was imposed on Hill.

Sunshine grates have maximum strength

Sunshine Furnace has four triangular grate bars, each having three distinct sides. In the single-piece and two-piece grate no such-like provision is made for expansion or contraction, and a waste of coal always follows a shaking.

On the left, and right-hand sides are cotter pins, which when loosened permit the grates to slide out. These four grate bars are made of heavy cast iron, and are finished up with building teeth. The teeth will grind up the toughest clinker; and

because the grates are made in sections, not only can nothing but dust and ashes pass through, but after each shaking a different side can be presented to the fire. Also, with the Sunshine grate there is no back-breaking movements attached to the shaking. By gently rocking the lever, first on the left and then on the right, the ashes are released on both sides, and fall through into the pan.
