# THE TIGERS WIN GRUELING GAME FROM THE MACKMEN AND LEAVE SECOND PLACE

Detroit Overcomes a Ponderous Lead and Snatches  
Victory From Philadelphia by Score  
of 7 to 6—A Good Game.

## KRAUSE WAS KNOCKED FROM THE BOX

Visitors Make Desperate Rally in Ninth, But Donovan Rescues  
Champions From Imminent Defeat—A Speedy Contest.

Detroit, Aug. 25.—Playing like the team that has twice captured the honors in the American League races, Detroit yesterday placed itself on even terms with Philadelphia, by humbling the Mackmen in a grueling battle, the score being 7 to 6.

With the Athletics in possession of what seemed a ponderous advantage—four runs—the Tigers began one of their old-time rallies, that ended only when the Champions had forged to the lead.

To the huge, brooding crowd, numbering close to 10,000 intensely excited fans, each realizing the importance of the series between the clubs, Philadelphia's advantage secured in the opening innings seemed insurmountable. It was with all the more gloom, therefore, that the victory snatched from the visitors was received by the fans.

### Game a Whirlwind.

Philadelphia proved a worthy foe in the first of three struggles scheduled for Bennett Park. Probably not before this season have two teams fought so desperately to land victory. The game belonged to either team until the last man had been retired.

With one down in the ninth inning, the Athletics made a determined effort to seize the contest. They filled the bases with the heavy end of their batting list coming up, but Donovan pulled Summers from the mound and sent Donovan in.

### A Fight Box.

The first man to face the Smiler was "Eddie" Collins, the hardest hitter in the American League. To pass him was taking a risk, for there were other heavy hitters following him. Donovan took the chance and walked Collins. The bases were filled and Baker up. Donovan struck him out. Davis followed with a single, but he flew to Crawford. And thus ended the hard-fought duel.

### Donovan to Rescue.

When Jennings replaced Summers with Donovan, he made his strategic move. Philadelphia had found no difficulty in connecting with the "Big Chief" and he was found for an even dozen hits. The California fans seemed kindly to extricate his teammates from the alarming situation the final score would undoubtedly have read differently.

### Krause Knocked Out.

And Summers was not alone compelled to leave the box. Krause, Mack's star twirler, who had been kept in reserve and fasting for over a week in preparation for the Tiger feast, shared a similar fate. It differed from Summers' only in that it came earlier. After Detroit had worked the marvel for four runs in the seventh inning, he was indignantly derided and Dygert took his place. It was the severest beating he has ever received during his big league career. No crowd welcomed his exit more warmly than did that at Bennett Park yesterday.

### Cobb Makes It Possible.

Dygert proved to be just what was needed to check the Bengals. There were two out when he went to the mound; Delehanty was on second. The pitcher fanned Moriarty, preventing any further damage. In the following round he was found for one hit, but he tightened up quickly and retired the side without a tally.

To Tyrus Cobb goes the lion's share of the credit for turning defeat into victory. It was an error by the Georgian in the opening inning that permitted Philadelphia its first score, but Cobb made amends for the offense in later periods of the game.

### Who Tyrod.

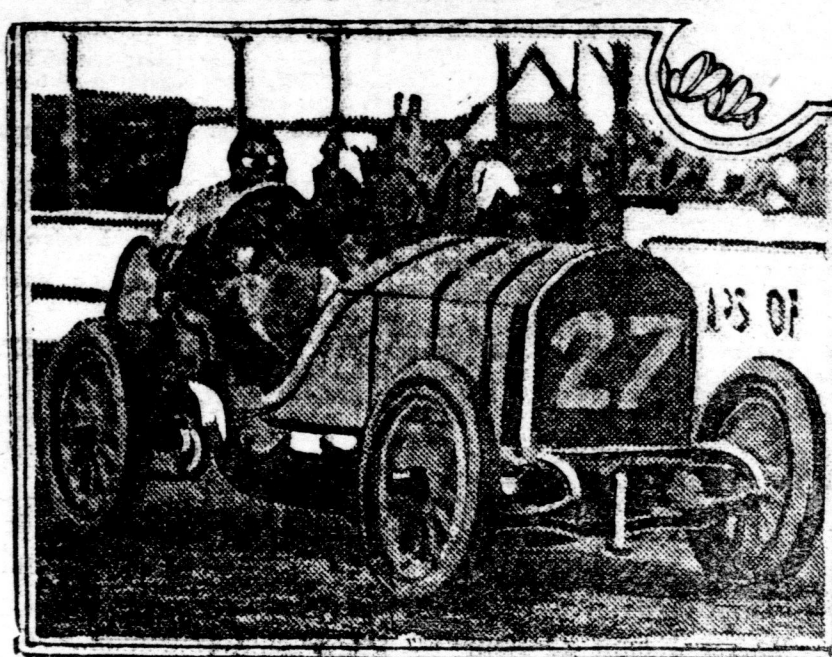
His single in the fourth inning was eventually converted into the Detroit's first run. With the count 5 and 3 in the Athletics' favor in the seventh inning, Cobb doubled and Stange and Bush crossed the plate, evening it up. Crawford beat out a hit to first a moment later and Tyrod came all the way from second with the tally that put the Champions in the lead.
