Secretary D. A. McDermid of the London Temperance League, who re turned from the annual convention in Toronto last night, stated to The Advertiser today that while the matter of asking for a vote on local option in London is still under advisement, it is unlikely that anything will be done this year.

POLICY OF EDUCATION.

"The policy that it was decided to pursue in all the larger cities and towns is one of education. Every county will be covered in one day; that is, there will be temperance speakers in every pulpit in every church in certain counties. Next Sunday every pulpit in North York will be occupied. It is thought that very effective work can be done in that way." gatherings as far west as the moun-UP TO MUNICIPALITIES.

"It is up to the municipalities themselves to initiate campaigns this year. The alliance will furnish speakers for the educational campaign, but if the people are not sufficiently interested after that to carry the matter on It will not be done.'

The tone of the convention was optimistic. Seventy-seven municipalitie will go dry on May 1, as a result of the vote in January. Fifty-fifive were held up by virtue of the three-fifths requirement, and 26 only recorded an adverse majority. Practical business men are viewing this question now from an economic standpoint, and are lining up in favor of local option. THE CONVENTION.

The convention was one of the largest and strongest I have ever attended. Delegates were there from every part of the province. Merchants, manufacturers, farmers, lawyers, doctors, ministers, city aldermen, county town and township councillors, license commissioners and inspectors, W. C. T. U. officers and representatives of all the temperance organizations of the province. I doubt if any parliament assembles a more representative, prac tical or saner body of legislators than came together at this great conven The deputation to the Government this year comprised five men only, in-

stead of the whole convention as in former years. They asked as usual fo the abolition of the three-fifths requirement. For the first time since deputations have been waiting on him he intimated that the Government would give the matter consideration. Hitherto he had not gone as far as that.
