Of eight sections in Manhattan seven showed an increase of 87 per cent. in two years; six sections in the Bronx, 25 in Brooklyn and five in Queens showed an increase in assessed value of exactly 100 per cent In Richmond three of five sections showed increases of 60 per cent. The

sections covered several blocks. Out of a total of 2,609 blocks in Manhattan one-fifth shows the lowest foot: one-quarter does not contain a lot assessed at less than \$3.50 per square foot; one-thirteenth does not contain a lot assessed at less than \$2 a square foot, and one-sixty-second does not contain a lot assessed at less
