PRISON COMMISSION SOON READY TO REPORT

Labor Question is Taking up Interest at Present.

[Canadian Press.] Kingston, Jan. 15.—The members of the prison reform commission are at last on the final stage of their work. Before leaving for Toronto this afternoon, G. M. Macdonnell, the chairman, stated that he expected to have his report ready for the Government inside of three to four weeks. The principal matter which is taking up the attention of the commission now is the labor question and the chairman is in hopes of securing information which will be of great value to the commission at the session to be held in Toronto tomorrow, when prominent labor men will give evidence before the commission. On Saturday the commission will take up parole work with the prison parole board.

The chairman will return from Toronto on Monday, where arrangements will be made for the commission's trip to St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary. After this prison has been inspected the commission members will be ready to frame their report.

The commission held its first session in Kingston on October 1 and has been in session off and on since then.

Flashes From The Wire

New York, Jan. 15.—Further improvement was reported today in the condition of Madame Lillian Nordica, stricken with pneumonia after escaping shipwreck near Thursday Island, off the coast of Australia.

Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—The remains of Sir Joseph Dubuc, former chief justice of Manitoba, were this morning interred with impressive service of the Roman Catholic Church in the cemetery of St. Boniface. Pontifical high mass was celebrated by His Grace Archbishop Langevin, assisted by Very Rev. J. Allard.

Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—The earnings of the Winnipeg electric railway on actual street car operation in the city of Winnipeg for the calendar year of 1913, were \$2,384,597.28, an increase of \$269,604.48 over the earnings for 1912. The excess of the city will therefore be enriched February 1 by a check for \$125,788.96, as called for in its franchise agreement with the company.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Jan. 15.—The revenue cutter Ketchikan reached here from Nantucket. Sheals today towing the schooners Silver Spray, Daniel McLeod and Sunlight. All were badly iced up, and their crews were suffering from frostbites.

INHALED GAS. [Canadian Press.] New York, Jan. 15.—Richard D. Lankford, a vice-president and secretary of the Southern Railway, apparently committed suicide today by inhaling gas in his apartments in Brooklyn. He was soon to have been married to a Brooklyn society girl.

FORMER LONDON MAN NEW YORK SUICIDE

Jumped From Fourth Floor of Bellevue Hospital—Despondent With Illness.

New York, Jan. 15.—Frederick Pisson, a Canadian 27 years old, who has been in this city two weeks, committed suicide at 6:15 Thursday afternoon by jumping from the balcony of the fourth floor of Bellevue Hospital. He was despondent because he had tuberculosis of the spine and believed he would not recover.

Pisson had a year ago resided here for a few weeks with a family on Maitland street north. He later went to work for a farmer named Smith the other side of Dorchester. After he left the farmer all trace of him was lost.

A letter sent from Toronto, signed "Bob," was found on his body by the New York authorities. The body at present is in charge of a coroner, and the New York police are making an effort to find the dead man's relatives.

MANITOBA OPPOSES ABOLISHING THE BAR

Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—The Manitoba Legislature decided today against taking a referendum on the question of abolishing the bar in this province. The resolution came from the Opposition side of the House, its sponsor being J. B. Baird, member for Mountain, who introduced a similar resolution last year.

Senator Roblin moved in amendment that it would be undesirable to change from the present system, and affirming the principle of prohibition by means of local option. The Premier urged that to abolish the bars would simply drive the business into the hands of the wholesalers. The Opposition tried to have the Premier's amendment ruled out of order, but the Speaker refused to rule in their favor and his decision was upheld by a straight party vote, 23 to 12. The amendment was afterwards carried by a similar vote.

Liberal Leader T. C. Norris today introduced a resolution asking the Dominion Government for free trade with the United States in agricultural implements. The debate on this was adjourned.

Windsor.—On the request of Robert Rell, who was defeated by one vote in election, Judge Drummond, of Windsor, has ordered an official recount. No corruption is charged.
