GRANDMOTHER OF RUSSIAN REVOLT AGAIN FAILS IN ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE

Jumped From Fourth Floor of Bellevue Hospital-Despondent With Illness.

New York, Jan. 15 .- Frederick Pisson, a Canadian 27 years old, who has been in this city two weeks, committed suicide at 5:15 Thursday afternoon by jumping from the balcony of the fourth floor of Bellevue Hospital. He was despondent because he had tuberculosis of the spine and believed he would not recover.

Pisson had a year ago resided here for a few weeks with a family on Maitland street north. He later went to work for a farmer named Smith the other side of Dorchester. After he left the farmer all trace of him was lost.

A letter sent from Toronto, signed "Bob," was found on his body by the New York authorities. The body at present is in charge of a coroner, and the New York police are making an effort to find the dead man's relatives.

MANITOBA OPPOSES ABOLISHING THE BAR

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Winnipeg, Jan. 15 .- The Manitoba Legislature decided today against taking a referendum on the question of abolishing the bar in this province. The resolution came from the Opposition side of the House, its sponsor being J. B. Baird, member Mountain, who introduced a similar THREE-YEAR-OLD BOY DROWNED | where the body was taken from the resolution last year.

Premier Roblin moved in amendment that it would be undesirable to change from the present system, and affirming the principle of prohibition by means of local option. The Premier urged that to abolish the bars would simply drive the business into the hands of the wholesalers. The Opposition tried to have the Premier's amendment ruled out of order, but the Speaker refused to rule in their favor and his decision was upheld by a straight party vote, 23 to 12. The amendment was afterwards carried by
