MANUFACTURER'S MEET PLEASES
LARGE CROWD IN QUEEN'S PARK

Splendid Program Provided Under Ideal Weather Conditions
—Dellow Wins Marathon Race for Second Time—
Vincent Adams Carries Off Individual Honors With Four Firsts.

The manufacturers' athletic meet, held in Queen's Park Saturday afternoon, lived up to its advance notices and provided a fine program of track events before a crowd numbering close to 2,000. The meet was ideal for the occasion and the track in great shape. The large number of events were run off in apple-pie order and with speed that was pleasing to the spectators. All the events were well filled, and the competition for the prizes was of the keenest.

The twelve-mile modified marathon race proved a big attraction. It was won by Jimmie Dellow, the former St. Marthe lad, who won it last year also. Dellow ran a fine race and finished well ahead of Cook, of Stratford, who was second. Indian, who was third, was from Toronto. Finished third. All three boys were strong at the finish, and appeared to have suffered no ill-effects from the long grind in the second game, which may keep him out of the game for some time.

Cook led on Second Lap. The positions were little changed on the second lap. Cook of Stratford, was leading by ten feet, with Phillips and Dellow running second, side by side. The leaders being a good half mile ahead of the tail-enders. Cook, by passing that store first on the second lap, Dellow was leading the third time around, with Cook close behind and Phillips and Phillips strung out some distance in the rear. They entered the track in that order, with Second, of Detroit, close behind. The latter ran a faster two miles around the track than any of the other runners. He passed Allen and Phillips about the third lap, and finished in fourth place.

Judges Make an Error. A place of last importance the judges resulted in Second, Allen and Phillips doing an extra lap. They had completed four laps, but were sent around again by some of the judges, who had apparently lost count. The matter was straightened out after considerable difficulty and a lot of explaining. Archie Ashford, of McCormick's, was the only London runner to finish.

Vincent Adams the Individual Winner. In the track events, Vincent Adams, of Jones & Sons, carried off individual honors with four firsts, winning every event he competed in. Jones & Sons carried off
