SUBMARINE WAITED FOR THE LUSITANIA

The submarine approached the coast after having manoeuvred on the surface for some time then dived and disappeared.

The Transylvania's cabins were crowded, her agents said. There were 879 passengers aboard, and others who wanted to go, according to the line, could not be ccommodated because of lack of room. Capt. Black, who was recently transferred to the Transylvania, from the British auxiliary cruiser Columbia, commanded the ship.
