Five Passengers Aboard From St. Thomas.

ST. THOMAS, May 7.—The news of the sinking of the great English ocean greyhound Lusitania was received in St. Thomas with much excitement.

Gerrard, 21 Anne's Place, while two other steamship tickets were sold in the city for passage on the ill-fated liner, but their names could not be obtained.

AMERICAN OFFICIALS KNEW OF THE PLANS TO DESTROY VESSEL

Only Concern Now as to Whether American Lives Are Lost.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—President Wilson was informed of the sinking of the Lusitania, and White House officials showed keen anxiety to learn whether any American lives were lost. No comment was made.
A few days ago, American officials heard privately, from personal sources that Germany intended to destroy the Lusitania at the first opportunity, to terrorize British shipping and restrict ocean commerce with the allies.
It was taken for granted by officials here that if there existed a plan in the German admiralty to torpedo the Lusitania every precaution had been suggested to the submarine commander to insure the safety of the passengers. The German embassy here from time to time has declared that the purpose of the German submarine campaign was not to cause a loss of life but to strike a blow at British shipping and commerce.
While the United States in its note to Germany has insisted that before any vessels aboard were sunk, passengers must be removed to a place of safety, no case had arisen until the wrecking of the Lusitania last Saturday, the investigation of which has not yet been completed.
Should any Americans lose their lives the case would be covered, officials thought, by the warning to Germany that she would be held in that event by the U.S. "to a strict accountability."

HOLLAND IS ROUSED OVER SINKING OF SHIP

AMSTERDAM, May 7.—The news of the sinking of the Lusitania has caused a tremendous sensation in Holland. The Amsterdam newspapers published numerous extra editions, and the keenest interest was displayed as to whether Dutch passengers were among the missing.

Pure Piracy Says Roosevelt of Torpedoing

Ex-President Strongly Condemns Establishment of German Sub. Blockade.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 7.—When informed tonight of the sinking of the Lusitania, Col. Theodore Roosevelt made the following statement to the Canadian Press:
"I can only repeat what I said a week ago, when, in similar fashion, the American vessel Gulfight was destroyed off the English coast and her captain lost his life. I then called attention to what I said two months previously, when the Germans established this war zone, and announced that with mines and submarines they would commit the crime that since they have actually committed, and that these deeds could by no rule of international law be regarded otherwise than as pure piracy."

"IDLE TO WASTE WORDS," "SET TEETH AND GO ON"

LONDON, May 8.—1:54 a.m.—The Morning Post, in an editorial on the Lusitania, after remarking on the elaborate warnings issued at New York before the ship sailed, says:
"In the face of this crime it is idle to waste words in condemnation. We must set our teeth and go on with the war with more courage and determination."

RUSSIA DECLINES TO ADMIT DEFEAT

Several German Army Corps Arrive to Reinforce the Enemy.

LATTER CLAIMS A VICTORY

Declares Battles on Lower Danube Have Ended in Complete Success.

PETROGRAD (via London), May 8.—12:05 a.m.—The following official communication was issued last evening:
"In the region of Mitau (Courland), our troops have continued to press the enemy closely.
"In the direction of Mlava we have continued to develop the success recently achieved. In this district yesterday we occupied the villages of Marciszew and Grzymki and repulsed three counter-attacks. Repeated attempts of the Germans to recapture the farm of Pomikany were barren of results.
"The enemy yesterday attempted to cross the Pilica River in the region of Kozlowitz, but was repulsed by our fire.
"In Galicia, between the Vistula and Carpathians, fighting continues with the same desperation and has assumed the character of a great battle. In this region the arrival of several German army corps has been revealed.
"In the direction of Mezahorow we repulsed with the bayonet six vigorous enemy attacks. The number of the enemy's wounded captured in the region of Makukia is increasing.
"In the Valley of the Lomnitsa we also have gained important successes."

AUSTRIAN REPORT.

VIENNA (via London), May 7.—10:12 p.m.—The following official statement was issued by the war office tonight:
"The Austro-Hungarian and German troops have crossed the Wisloka River in the district between Pilsno and Jaslo. The advanced troops are south of Jaslo. Strong Austrian troops in the Bukia-Rymnow district have the Carpathian roads along which the Russians in irregular columns, are retreating in a northern and northeastern direction, pursued by the allied armies advancing across the Beskides.
"The number of prisoners and amount of booty are increasing. Our tenth corps yesterday captured five heavy and sixteen light cannon.
"Our troops in the eastern part of the Carpathian front are repulsing, in the meantime, desperate Russian attacks, with heavy losses to the enemy. A Russian attack yesterday against Gory Heigt was repulsed by our artillery. We captured 1,200 prisoners. Several detachments were annihilated by our flanking fire.
"In southeast Galicia, all attempts of the enemy to take several vantage points have failed."

DEFEAT, SAYS BERLIN.

BERLIN, May 7.—The German official statement today said:
"The battles to the south of Szadow and east of Roselnie ended in a decided defeat for the Russians, who suffered heavy losses. In prisoners alone, they lost 1,500, and are in full retreat.
"South of Katwarza, south of Augustow, and west of Przasnysz, part of the attacks were repulsed by us with sanguinary losses. In these battles the Russians lost, altogether, 520 prisoners.
"In the southeastern theatre:
"The battles on the right bank of the lower Dunajec ended yesterday in complete success for the allied troops. The enemy is engaged in the quickest possible retreat towards the east. Only a small division of the enemy on the Vistula still holds out.
"Further to the south we advanced on the right bank of the Wisloka River in the direction of Wislok and across the Jaselska. Many times, parts of the right wing of the army under Gen. Von Mackenzen came in touch with the Russian column coming from the Carpathian front, west of Lukupnow Pass. The Russians are hastily retreating before the closely-following Austro-German troops. With every step forward, our booty increases."

GWYNNE VANDERBILT AND CHARLES FROHMAN GONE?

QUEENSTOWN, May 8.—1:36 a.m.—Every effort to find Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt and Charles Frohman among the survivors of the Lusitania landed here has failed.
Officials of the Cunard Line are attempting to prepare a list of the saved, but their task has been rendered extremely difficult by the indescribable confusion which prevails. The names of those landed at Kinsale and Clonakilly are not yet available here.
Four torpedoed were fired at the Lusitania, but two of them missed. The steamer was flying the British flag.
There appears to be a large proportion of the ship's crew among the survivors landed here.

SUBMARINE WAITED FOR THE LUSITANIA

CORK, Ireland, May 8.—5:45 a.m.—Indications that German submarines were seeking the Lusitania were afforded Thursday afternoon by the reported presence of a submarine in Dunmanus Bay, an inlet on the south coast of Ireland next to Bantry Bay, County Cork, and 80 miles west of Queenstown. The submarine approached the coast after having manoeuvred on the surface for some time then dived and disappeared.

TRANSYLVANIA, CABINS FILLED, TAKES THE RISK

NEW YORK, May 7.—The British steamer Transylvania, of the Anchor Line, sailed late today for Liverpool, a few hours after news of the Lusitania's sinking had been received. The Transylvania's cabins were crowded, her agents said. There were 879 passengers aboard, and others who wanted to go, according to the line, could not be accommodated because of lack of room. Capt. Black, who was recently transferred to the Transylvania, from the British auxiliary cruiser Columbia, commanded the ship.
"I have been hunting for a submarine ever since this war began," was his comment on this trip, and that she comes close enough for me to ram her."
"Do you expect to fly the American flag when you reach the war zone?" he was asked.
"No, sir, I'll take my ship to port with the flag of England flying, or not at all," he replied.
All precautions, however, Capt. Black said, would be observed when the Transylvania reached the war zone. Of the Transylvania's passengers 117 were in the first cabin, 210 in the second and 452 in the steerage. Almost half the passengers were from Canada, it was said. There was little nervousness apparent among the passengers, all of whom had heard of the Lusitania's fate. Twelve last-minute cancellations were recorded. This, it was said, was your utmost number. Four of those who cancelled their passage, the officials said, did so because of sickness. The reason why the others cancelled was not disclosed. The Transylvania, due to sail at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, was an hour late in getting away.

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GERMAN OFFICIAL BLAMES BRITISH

NEW YORK, May 8.—Captain Franz Von Pippen, military attache of the Imperial German embassy, is quoted by the New York World this morning as making the following statement regarding the sinking of the Lusitania.
"It is deplorable, if true, that so many lives have been lost, shocked to hear the news, especially that American lives have been sacrificed.
"But it was absolutely criminal for the Cunard Company—and for the British Government—to allow the line to carry—neutral passengers in a ship which was transporting explosives and munitions of war to be used by her allies. The ship's manifest will show that she carried a large amount of picric acid and other explosive materials. They certainly were not intended for peaceful uses. They were to be used against Germany, and Germany had to defend herself against them. The best way was to destroy the ship, and such destruction was amply justified under the rules of war."

AMERICANS AROUSED.

LONDON, May 8.—2:51 a.m.—The Times devotes a long article in its news column to the attitude of Americans in London on the disaster, saying: "The sinking of the Lusitania has aroused excitement and apprehension among the Americans in London."
