EL PASO, Texas, July 31.—Two Americans were killed and one wounded in a clash with Mexican bandits, who had crossed the Rio Grande five miles below Fort Hancock, Texas, early today. There were five bandits in the party, all of them being killed, according to General Bell, commanding at El Paso.

John Twomey, Troop "E," Eighth U. S. Cavalry, and Robert Woods, a United States customs inspector, were killed.

LILLE PEOPLE TRANSFERRED TO BE FED, SAY GERMANS

[Canadian Press.] Amsterdam, Aug. 1.—The transfer by the Germans of some thousands of the inhabitants of Lille and its neighborhood to other places is explained by the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung as due to the impossibility of feeding them in overcrowded localities. The paper says that the natives were sent to places where the distribution of food was easier, and at the same time where regions with small populations could receive the necessary working power. It adds that the transferred people were well treated.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO AID NEW TRADE CORPORATION

[Canadian Press.] London, Aug. 1.—The Government will ask Parliament to sanction a state subsidy of £500,000 yearly for a decade to the newly-formed British and Italian Trading Corporation, Reginald McKenna, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the House of Commons yesterday. The corporation, which has a capital of £1,000,000 subscribed privately by banks, is for the purpose of assisting trade and commerce between Great Britain and Italy.

RUSHING RELIEF TO THE FIRE REFUGEES; SOLDIERS ASSISTING

Country Now Merely Smoldering Furnace.

FIRE MONSTER OVERCOME

No Damage at Enghelart Except for One or Two Fires.

TORONTO, July 31.—With Matheson wiped out, the best section of Cochrane destroyed and numerous small settlements in ruins or entirely obliterated, the fire monster that has been raging in the northern country since last Thursday has at last ceased its career of destruction. Heavy rains, which broke over the fire-swept region at 9 o'clock last night have quenched the flames. The country is a smoldering, smoking furnace, but the Ontario Government has received word that the situation is well in hand, the worst is over and the suffering are having their hands extended to receive every possible way. Premier Hearst and Hon. G. Howard Ferguson have been on duty since they received messages yesterday telling of the fire. This morning they received reliable information from the north, which would indicate that the reports of the fire losses have been exaggerated. The total loss added to the bodies that have been recovered amounts for 184 people, and the Government says that this is the outside limit.

Enghelart Escapes. There was no damage at Enghelart, although one or two small fires occurred. At Timmins, seventeen houses were burned down. Then there were a number of small places that had been destroyed by the fire. The premier's information was to the effect that 37 bodies had been found at the village of Nushka, and this brought the official total of dead and missing up to 184.

"The relief work throughout the district is well in hand," said the premier. "Everything possible is being done. We will spare no expense to give the necessary relief. The C. P. R. and G. T. R. are co-operating with the T. and N. O. to give relief to the fire-stricken regions. The relief work is being carried on over the lines, giving free transportation to the settlers. The reports have been somewhat exaggerated, but the situation is bad enough. Our relief train is reported to have been at Matheson, but should get through to Cochrane by noon."

Soldiers Helping. "I have been asked in having the militia department send 100 men and three officers to the district to assist in the relief work," said Hon. Mr. Ferguson. "The soldiers are rushing supplies and everything needed in the work from North Bay."

Mr. Ferguson intimated that in order to assist the settlers who have been burned out, Fred Dunn, the loan commissioner, will be authorized to advance money from the Northern Ontario fund so that they may rebuild their homes. "Mr. Dunn has been in the north and he has been in the north and he has been in the north," explained Mr. Ferguson. "Consequently the timber was carried long distances by the light winds. It does not take a fire of that kind long to spread."

Regarding financial relief for the settlers, Premier Hearst said that the Government could not vote a sum until the Legislature met. "You can be sure, though, that we will provide for those who have suffered, both in the necessities for living and in a financial way," said he. "The Government will not hesitate to use every cent needed by the suffering."

OFFERS OF HELP. From Montreal and as far west as Winnipeg aid has been proffered to the fire sufferers in Northern Ontario. Hon. G. Howard Ferguson has received offers of help from Ottawa, Hamilton, St. Thomas and other Ontario cities, from boards of trade, from municipal corporations, and from individuals. The relief trains rushed north from North Bay and from Timmins carried food enough to last for two days, and the initial shipment will be followed by others.

In order to eliminate overlapping and waste, the distribution of supplies is being handled by a committee, which Commissioner Lee is the executive head.

GEORGE BLATCHFORD DROWNS AT GODERICH

Body of Young Listowel Newspaperman Has Not Been Found.

[Special to The Advertiser.] GODERICH, July 31.—George Blatchford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Blatchford of Exeter, was drowned here this afternoon. The body has not been recovered and the finding of his clothes on the river bank gave the first clue to the accident.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Blatchford of Exeter and a cousin of C. W. Blatchford, proprietor of the Listowel Banner. Only last week he went to Listowel to work on the paper. He came here Friday on an excursion and went in for a swim near the mouth of the Maitland River. The current is very swift and it is supposed carried him out. All efforts to locate the body have been unsuccessful.

GERMANS MOWN DOWN IN FUTILE EFFORT TO TAKE GROUND NORTH OF SOMME

Counter-Attacks on Hem Wood and Monacu Farm Fail, Allies Holding All Gains Made Sunday—Aviators Bomb Military Factories.

PARIS, via London, July 31.—11:59 p.m.—The war office communication, made public tonight, says: "North of the Somme the Germans today continued their counter-attacks in the Hem Wood and on the Monacu farm. All their attacks failed with serious losses and we maintained the captured positions."

"On Tuesday, the 30th, the artillery duels continue violent in the sectors of Thiaumont wood and Fleury."

"There is nothing important to report from the rest of the front."

"During Sunday night one of our air squadrons bombarded military factories at Thionville and the stations of Conflans and Audun-le-Roman, as well as villages in the region of Etain."

MEN ENDURE BURNS IN OFFERING BODIES TO SHIELD FAMILIES

Tales of Quiet Heroism Filter Through From the North.

COBALT, Ont., July 31.—There are at present 19 injured in the Lady Minto Hospital at New Liskeard. The list is: Mrs. Gibson and two daughters, Ida and Geraldine, Fred Dunn, the loan commissioner, who is seriously injured, Thomas Hall, Minnie Harding, John Shaw, Mrs. McWhirter and three children, Leopold Soblet, Mrs. Ladd, W. H. Hinton, Duncan Graham, Albert Schultz, Mrs. John McCallum and two children, Etta and Eric, all of Matheson and district.

Duncan Graham, who is seriously injured and his wife and child, in a trench, covered them with blankets and kept the fire from passing. His clothes were almost burned from his body.

Mostly Destitute. Nearly all the survivors are utterly destitute, and their only chance of life as they were brought out on rescue trains. W. Leach, a settler just outside Matheson, who two days ago had a fire on his farm, and stood in a pair of shoes when he reached New Liskeard. He rushed into the lake just before a wave of fire struck across his path. He saved his farm hands sat on a raft and threw blankets soaked in water over their heads.

At Painskeller Lake, the foreman at Cartwright mine saved all his men. Four of them set out in a boat, and waves were so high it was capsize before they were forty feet from shore and it was an hour before they touched bottom again.

On Saturday night, before the fire got full sweep, dense clouds of smoke obscured the sky, and men and women felt their way through thick fumes, tumbling their way back to safety. Those who have headed rescue parties fear to think what the draws and hollows of the countryside will reveal.

Croesus Mine, in Munro Township, and all surrounding district are swept clear.

ALARMING REPORT. HAILEYBURY, July 31.—From reports received from the fire-swept area in Northern Ontario, the death toll levied by the flames is placed at 240, made up as follows: Nushka, 67; Mon-teith, 63; Ramore, 13; Kelso, 2; Troquois Falls, 15; Matheson, 60; Cochrane, 20.

It is possible that this list may be augmented by the bodies later reported in from outlying farms and settlements.

A stalled freight train at Matheson, where only three houses were left standing, was instrumental in saving the lives of many of the inhabitants. When hope of saving the town had been abandoned, a number of women and children were placed in the box cars, and the train was headed south, through walls of fire. The train was stopped by a wall of fire, and the occupants had to be transferred to other cars.

Lost Their Chance. In the neighborhood of Matheson settlers had a terrible experience. At Nushka, the French-Canadian settlement, ten miles north of Matheson, the residents had a chance to escape on a train, but were confident that they could save their homes, and declined the opportunity. Shortly afterwards the flames, fanned by a strong wind, swept down on the village, and over 50 of the residents sought refuge in a rock cut near the settlement. They were suffocated by the vast volume of smoke, and their bodies were later recovered.

Edward Reid, a prospector who had been living about 20 miles up the Abitibi River, with eight companions, lay for many hours in the water waiting for the flames to pass, and finally made his way to safety.

Outside Matheson in one roomhouse sixteen persons were suffocated. On the Fromm farm 25 people sought refuge, but were hemmed in by a wall of flame and all perished.

Heroic Rescues. William Fairbairn, a prospector, who rendered material assistance in saving life, describes the fire as a living wall of flame sweeping down on Matheson at the rate of 60 miles an hour. With others he rushed the women and children to the siding, where a freight train was standing and dispatched them south. It was in the outlying districts that the great loss of life occurred.

ITALY DENOUNCES TRADE PACT WITH THE GERMANS

Leaves Way Open for a Declaration of Hostilities.

[Canadian Press.] Paris, August 1.—The only reason which has so far prevented Germany from declaring war on Italy, says the Petit Parisien, is a commercial treaty signed between the two countries in 1914 and renewed in 1914. This treaty subordinated Italy to Germany economically, according to the paper, and was considered of the greatest importance by Germany.

The Parisien says that it understands Italy has now denounced this treaty and thereby left the way clear for a declaration of hostilities.

PREMIER ASQUITH SKETCHES PLANS FOR IRISH GOVT.

Military Forces and Lord-Lieutenant To Stay.

JOHN REDMOND OBJECTS

Declares the Unionists Are Being Given All the Power.

LONDON, July 31.—In bringing the Irish situation to the front again in the House of Commons today, by the introduction of a motion urging the Government to disclose its plan for the government of Ireland during the war, John Dillon said he had entered into negotiations with Lloyd George for a solution of the Irish question most unwillingly, knowing the enormous difficulties they had before them in getting the Government to agree to any terms for the settlement of the Irish question. There was the enormous opportunity it would give various factions in Ireland to make the Government's power of the Nationalist leader, to make the government of Ireland hopelessly impossible if he could not secure the support of the Irish people for the settlement.

Blames Lansdowne. Lord Lansdowne, continued the speaker, by remaining in the cabinet after the Unionist members of that body had declined to accept the condition that the Nationalists should remain in their full number, had been responsible for the breaking up of negotiations. Only after the Ulster Nationalists had accepted the terms had Lord Lansdowne publicly announced his views. The premier had said there should be no coercion of Ireland which had hardly been applied all around, and there should be no coercion of the Nationalist portion of Ireland which was to be excluded from home rule.

Premier Replies. Premier Asquith, taking up the subject, said that he was as much a party as Mr. Lloyd George to the negotiations and to the heads of the agreement, but that John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, had been constantly informing him of the views of the Unionist members of the cabinet. Reiterating his view that home rule, being on the statute books, could not be taken off, the premier continued that he was most anxious that the House should not pass any resolution which would be subject to revision by the cabinet.

UNITED FOR CLEANER GOVERNMENT WITH EFFICIENCY IN WEST

Sir Charles Tupper and H. C. Brewster Appeal

VANCOUVER, July 31.—A message has been published by British Columbia soldiers signed jointly by Sir Charles Tupper and H. C. Brewster, leader of the Opposition in the provincial Legislature, claiming to represent the public sentiment of the province and calling on them to use their vote against the Government. It says in part: "We believe a united effort should be made by the lovers of clean government and efficient administration, both the Liberals and Conservatives, to drive out of the men who are misgoverning our province."

No Reduction of Forces. Martial law, he said, never had been actually in force. All proceedings had been taken under the defence of the realm act. He hoped the form of continuance of martial law would be short, and a warning tribute to the tact and discretion of General Maxwell, who, he said, always leaned to the side of mercy.

Under existing circumstances, the premier asserted, it would not be right to reduce substantially the military force in Ireland, which was put there for the purpose of protecting the population against any misguided action of irresponsible persons.

Premier Asquith said it was necessary to have the civil execution of the scheme of a provisional council to advise the chief secretary, he asserted. He repeated that he would not allow that they were dealing with a period of transition, for he had not abandoned hope that in a short time, shorter than some of his Irish people would be able to arrive at a permanent arrangement.

Lord-Lieutenancy Stays. The premier stated, therefore, that during this period it would not be advisable to attempt ambitious experiments. The lord-lieutenancy of Ireland would be maintained, but it was not urgent necessary to nominate a lord-lieutenant at present. The important thing was to get an effective head of the civil executive. It was necessary to appoint a chief secretary to the cabinet, who would spend the bulk of his time in Ireland. The Government sought some one with a broad mind, a firm hand, administrative capacity, sympathy with the Irish people and a desire for a settlement. The premier thought those qualifications should be found in Henry E. Duke, member of Parliament for Exeter.

Murmurs of dissent were heard from the Irish benches, while John Dillon, Nationalist member for East Mayo, exclaimed: "You ought to have Middleton as lord-lieutenant," this being a cynical reference to Isaac Middleton, one of the die-hard Unionists opposing home rule. The premier replied that he hoped Mr. Duke would start his duties with the good-will of the House. His first business would be carefully to survey the administrative system and factors which made for good and ill. Every arrangement would be of a strictly provisional character for the duration of the war, and if an agreement was reached it would be for a still shorter period.

Redmond Up in Arms. John Redmond said that if Sir Edward Carson stood by the agreement as the Nationalists stood by it, they would, in effect, shake hands on the floor of the House. The premier, he said, who only last week announced

that Dublin Castle rule was dead, now stated his intentions of setting up a castle rule again. The chief secretary for Ireland and the attorney-general, Mr. Redmond continued to speak the rulers of Ireland. The Government, therefore, was setting up a purely Unionist executive and that was an unfounded outrage on the feelings of the Irish people. The Government, he asserted, was going to set up the castle again, but refused to bring to the castle an executive of the home rulers. Mr. Redmond declared that he had tested in the name of the Nationalist party against such a proposal. The Government in making the proposal was taking on itself the full responsibility and the Nationalist leader, he left the hands of the Nationalists free to watch, criticize and oppose, if necessary, the coalition Government's administration, how and whenever they pleased.

Kisses Usless. Lord Hugh Cecil, member for Oxford University, contended that the Unionist Government has not been so successful as was claimed. He said he was most surprised, considering the difficulty of enforcing law and order in Ireland, that the Unionist members of the cabinet and Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, went as far as they did. It was impossible to settle the Irish problem by round table conferences. They were up against a closed door, and it was useless to kiss each other. Nothing Lord Hugh added, ought to be settled until after the war.

Andrew Bonar Law, secretary for the colonies, followed. He said it was Lord Lansdowne's personal opinion that it was undesirable to put the Lloyd George agreement into force now, it might be possible after the war. He could not bring forward an operation of the home rule bill only by convincing her or by coercion, and if the Nationalists considered coercion undesirable, they were on the same ground as the Unionist members of the cabinet. There never was any doubt that it was intended the excluded area should remain out of it was prepared to come in, said Bonar Law, and the moment he saw the Unionist members of the cabinet, he had told the premier that he could never agree to the retention of the Irish members in full strength in the House of Commons.

Nobody, the secretary continued, could foresee the distribution of the parties after the next election. If the Nationalists would judge all questions on their merits, he was not strongly opposed to a full Irish representation, but the Nationalists themselves had admitted that they would support whatever party backed them. The Unionist members of the cabinet were willing to allow the home rule bill to come into force now in order to get rid of the feeling of suspicion which existed in Ireland.

Mr. Bonar Law concluded by saying that he hoped from the bottom of his heart that every party in the House would remember the struggle the nation was now engaged in, and the words of some of the Irish members of the House, who declared they were heart and soul in the war, and would do nothing to interfere with the conduct of the war.

After a speech by John Devlin, the debate lost interest, and eventually Mr. Dillon's motion was formally agreed to without division.

ITALIANS STILL PRESSING MONTE CIMONE ATTACK

Austrians Repulsed in All Assaults on Positions Held by Allies.

ROME, July 31.—Via London.—The official statement given out by the war office today reads: "In the Adige valley, on the night of the 30th, the enemy attacked our positions at Castione and Zagnola, but was promptly repulsed. Yesterday the enemy's artillery was very active throughout the whole region between the Adige and Monte Paulbio."

In the Asiatic valley, the pressure against Monte Cimone is being continued. The enemy's heavy artillery yesterday bombarded Asiago. Some damage was done and several persons were injured. In the Travinigola valley the enemy, after receiving reinforcements, attacked our new positions at Asiago three times, but was unsuccessful in each case.

In the Drave valley our artillery again hit the railway station at Sillian. The remainder of the front there were no developments.
