

In other words, the new system of taxation is hitting at the owner of the cottage. The figures reveal that. To show just what the tax rate or 1922 means, three different kinds of buildings were taken. Two large downtown structures, two palatial residences and three cottages.

The residences were all picked from the same neighborhood, where the same assessor worked, and where land values are about the same.
