SUGGESTS AMENDMENT TO NORTH AMERICA ACT

Clifford Sifton Declares Conditions in Country Have Changed.

Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, Feb. 27.—"Canada today not the same as it was when the British North America Act was passed. New conditions have developed as a result of the passing years and the B. N. A. Should be amended to meet these new conditions."

This was the remark of Sir Clif ford Sifton last night, after he re turned from Montreal. He was asked for an explanation of his remarks made during his address before the Westerners' Club in that city, and in which he advocated amendments to the Canadian constitution "I only said," remarked Sir Clif-ford, "what many men think. There are several respects, perhaps, in which we have rather outgrown an act drafted and passed when Canada

was just becoming a confederation.
