CELEBRATE LANDING OF SCOTCH IN PICTOU

Sailors, Troops and Tourists Gather For Historic Pageant.

Pictou, N. S., July 17.—With the sleek gray ships of war of three nations lying in the harbor side by side with all varieties of sporting, pleasure and mercantile craft, the green hills dotted with white tents of troops and tourists, and the whole countryside thronged with visitors from all parts of the continent, this little town, hitherto tranquil and isolated, has taken on a remarkable transformation. The cause of it all is the elaborately planned anniversary celebration of the coming of the first Scotch settlers to Canada, one hundred and fifty years ago, and today a replica of the ship "Hector," which anchored off the bleak shores of Pictou harbor a century and a half ago, will sail up the harbor and the pageant of that historic event will be enacted on the bluffs of Pictou. Lady Byng and her party arrived this morning. Bearing the felicitations of the United States, Governor Cox of Massachusetts also arrived.

OLD RESIDENT DEAD, LIVED HERE 50 YEARS

Mrs. Elizabeth Liddicoat Came to City Half Century Ago.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Liddicoat, widow of Samuel Liddicoat, died this morning at her son's residence, St. James' street, in her 94th year. She had been a resident of this city for nearly 50 years, previously living in Toronto and Oshawa. Seventy-three years ago, with her father, mother, four brothers and five sisters, she came to Canada from Cornwall, England. All of that large family have passed on excepting the youngest sister, Mrs. Ellen Toulson of Butte, Montana. Two sons, W. H. Liddicoat, for many years principal of Talbot Street School, and E. J. Liddicoat, four granddaughters and two great-granddaughters, are all residents of this city. The funeral will take place on Thursday at 3 p.m. from the residence of W. H. Liddicoat, 181 St. James' street, and interment will be made in the family plot at Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Kelly of Stratford, formerly of Colborne Street Methodist Church, will be the officiating clergyman.

CALEDONIAN CLUB ARRANGES GREAT OUTING AT PORT

Scotchmen From Elgin and Middlesex Will Make Merry Tomorrow.

DANCING PROGRAM

Tomorrow the United Caledonian Societies of Middlesex and Elgin will hold their annual picnic at Port Stanley, and an especially interesting and entertaining program has been prepared by the committee in charge. Athletics appeal to the sturdy Scotch race, and there will be plenty of tests of agility and strength in the Caledonian games which feature the sports.

The big feature of the day will be a tug-of-war between the men of Middlesex and Elgin for a valuable trophy, and this tussle will be worth traveling many miles to witness. Last year Middlesex won, but Elgin has been preparing for a whole twelve months and the southern county may be expected to give a good account of itself.

It is the ambition of the Scotchmen to revive the Caledonian games which a few years ago attracted to Western Ontario some of the greatest of the world's athletes, and to this end there have been included in the contests such events as throwing the fifty-six pound weight, putting the shot, and the hop, step and jump.

Dancing Competition. The dancing competition has already attracted a list of fifty-six competitors, and they come from many places, including Cleveland and Columbus, Ohio, Chicago, Flint, Mich., and Montreal. Needless to say, there are very many from London and St. Thomas.

Four pipe bands have been entered for the prizes that have been offered. They are the Windsor Pipers, the Hamilton Pipers of London, the W. O. R. of London, and the G. W. V. A. of Ingersoll.

Secretary McPherson of St. Thomas declares the baby show will be the biggest and best ever at Port Stanley. Scotch babies fear no competition, and the show will be open to the world. Every winner of a first prize will be entitled to compete on Labor Day for the L. & P. S. grand sweepstakes prize of \$500 offered by the Northern Life Assurance Company of London. This prize will be awarded to the child that secures the greatest applause. When the winner attains his or her twentieth birthday, it will receive \$500 in cash, absolutely free. And further, the winner will be covered by insurance to the value of \$265 the first year, gradually increasing until at the end of twenty years the insurance will amount to \$500, for which the winning child will not have to pay one cent.

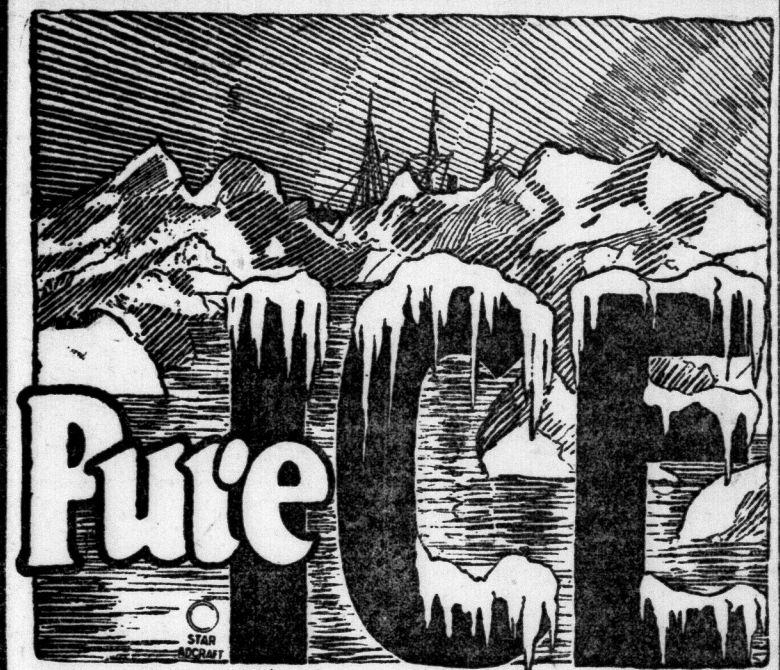
