THE CANADIAN COLORADO.
The New-Advertiser of Vancouver on Aug. 28 had an article entitled "The Canadian Colorado." It refers to the great annual revenue which the province will derive in the future from the thousands of tourists attracted by the unrivaled scenery of the mountains and coast. What has been the case in Colorado it predicts will be repeated in British Columbia, which it says possesses mountain scenery that rivals that of the Alps, with hundreds of miles of coast that will prove to be as great a delight to the tourist as a trip through the Florida or Norway. The New-Advertiser asserts that the superiority of British Columbia over Colorado is as great as the scenery along the Canadian Pacific Railway greater than that found on the line of the Union Pacific Railway, and adds: "We need not fear a comparison between the scenery of the Canadian National Park with the Garden of the Gods and Manitou, while Harrison Springs will easily rival the celebrated Las Vegas in New Mexico. As for the climate and that of Colorado, has nothing to compare with them, while the Royal George and the Grand Canyon of the Fraser will be forgotten when the traveler gazes on the passes and ravines through which the Canadian road runs in the mountains or on the canyon of the Fraser as he approaches the coast." Travelers, especially those who come from the United States, are loud in their praise of the scenery experienced in passing over the Canadian Pacific Railway. The company, too, has expended large sums of money at Banff, Glacier and Vancouver providing local accommodations. Mr. Van Horne predicts that the number of visitors next year, either bound for the coast as the object of their trip, or passing through on their way to the Orient and Australia, will be very large and far beyond what the people at Vancouver anticipate.
