The extinction of these beautiful, fleet creatures, seemingly so near at hand, will be less the result of systematic hunting, such as characterized the extermination of the buffalo, than the encroachments upon their feeding grounds by cattlemen and sheepmen with their herds, and the desultory shooting of sportsmen, ranchmen and cowboys, now so generally distributed over the plains, that the timid animals can find no place of security. NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS TO BE FOUGHT ON THIS QUESTION.

The Disability Bill Passed By the House But Imperial Assent Being Refused a Royal Commission Must Come — The Banks Denounced By the Press and the

St. John's, Nild., Jan. 20.-The newspapers are filled with denunciations o the management of the suspended banks here. One firm alone, it is shown, overdrew its account \$25,000 last year, for the greater part of which no assets existed. This firm executed a mortgage for \$70,000, but the mortgage was not registered. Another firm purchased

registered. Another firm purchased steamers with the money obtained from the banks. The steamers are now mortgaged to repay the money.

The creditors of several of the firms are opposing the ratification of the compromises offered, holding that the firms are able to pay more than they are offering. The creditors have filed objections with the Sapreme Court, urging that the trustees be appointed to carry on the business of those firms until ultimately wound up. This is objected to by the general public, because it would completely ruin the colony's trade in a year or two.

The Government party, it is understood, is preparing to face the country on the question of the Confederation issue. Governor O'Brien received a despatch from the Imperial Government last night refusing to assent to the bill for the removal of the disabilities of Sir William Whiteway and his colleagues.

This refusal will probably compel the Government to accept a royal commission to investigate the colony's affairs as in the resolutions asking the passage of this bill the Government admitted its incapacity to continue to conduct affairs.
