ble-witted friend who is thoroughly well acquainted with everybody present. A table, round or square, should be in readiness by covering it with a cloth long enough to come well to the floor. Under this secrete your friend, who is to act as the "spirit," turn out the lights except for the grate fire or a ghostly candle or two. At precisely the "witching hour of 12 inform your guests that now is the time to ask questions of the Halloween spirits. First find out if the "spirit" is present and ask solemnly on the table and ask if the Halloween spirits are in the room. Say, "If you are present, rap twice." The confederate beneath the table raps twice. Then ask if the spirits are willing for the guests to ask questions. Again comes two raps from under the table. The hostess then asks, "One rap will mean 'no'; two raps 'yes,' and three raps 'ask your mother.' Is this understood, mysterious spirit?" Is the confederate assents by giving two raps. Questions may now be asked and much fun occasioned, according to the cleverness of the "spirit."

Do not let October slip entirely by without making some preparation for bloom in the garden next spring. Nothing is lovelier or more easily grown than bulbs, such as the hyacinth, tulip, daffodil and crocus. For the three first named, spade your grass well and dig in some well-rotted manure. In planting bulbs allow but two inches from the base of the bulb to the top of the ground for small ones and about five inches for the larger ones. If you wish snowdrops or crocuses to come in the lawn use a sharp-pointed stick for planting the bulb. There is a special iron tool made for the purpose, but a stick answers very well. In planting any bulb always see that the soil is pressed firmly around it. This work takes precious time now, but you will feel more than amply repaid next spring when the dry, brown, uninteresting looking bulbs blossom forth like so many gay butterflies in the precincts of your garden.

OUR LETTER BOX.

Dear Peggy Wadson Seeing Pollyanna's request for a pumpkin jam recipe I venture to give my method. I don't say it is better than the one you print, but it is different, anyway. Cut two pounds pumpkin into small pieces and mix with two pounds sugar. Let stand overnight. To this add juice and grated rind of two oranges, and the juice of one lemon. Boil till nice and thick, put in jars and keep in dark cool place. Now for a bit of fun. Here is a bit of verse I found in my cook book. I'm very fond of pumpkin pie, but I don't believe I would like it served up to me "morning, night and noon." Do you?—Priscilla.

REDS ARE RETREATING BEFORE UKRAINIANS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.—Bolshevik Russian forces which have been fighting against the Ukrainians along the Dniester River are retreating over the entire front, it is stated in dispatches received here. Their line at present passes through the Town of Zmerinka, about 140 miles southwest of Kiev.

the House of Commons that the railway would have to be acquired and the then Opposition leader has replied that he had no objection. They had gone to Parliament with no bargain closed, as the leader of the Opposition had asserted at Victoria. No Government under the British North America Act could possibly ignore Parliament as had been alleged. They could be beaten at any time by a majority of one, he said. Some one shouted: "Resign."

"The Government will resign the moment it occurs," retorted the premier. Judging from recent votes, that was unlikely.

THE FISCAL POLICY.

"We stand," he said, "for a tariff based on the principle of protection. Not the kind of protection that will fleece the many for the benefit of the few, but for protection just sufficient to enable Canadian industries to operate in this country, to make Canadian goods for Canadians, to employ Canadian labor and to build up a Canadian home market. There are some who tell you that I am a high protectionist. I challenge such people to quote you any word of mine, either in Parliament or out of it, either in public or private, that will support such a claim. There is no question about where we stand. We stand clearly and definitely for a tariff adequate for the needs of Canadian industry, simply that and nothing more."

LIBERALS HONOR HIM.

The premier's visit here has, if anything, surpassed in success his visits to Winnipeg and Moose Jaw. On his arrival in the city he was greeted with an address of welcome by Mayor Cairns, a prominent Liberal, while at Westminister in the afternoon, where he addressed an audience which packed the opera house to the doors, David Whiteside, K. C., Liberal member of the Legislature, occupied the chair.

At the evening the largest theater in the city was unable to accommodate the great crowd which clamored for admittance, and an overflow meeting had to be arranged in the banquet hall of the Vancouver Hotel. Even then thousands tried and failed to hear the premier speak.

The premier's address largely followed the line laid down at Winnipeg and Moose Jaw, being mostly concerned with defense of the Government's record and with an enunciation of the new party's fiscal and economic creeds. He aroused his audiences to a high pitch of enthusiasm when, with characteristic power of logic, he analyzed the position of Mr. King, who, with a platform calling for free food and consequently free fruit, was yet supporting Col. Edgett in the by-election of Yale, the chief plank of whose platform was more protection for fruit.

MR. KING EXPOSED.

"And so," he said, "we find Mr. King standing for free fruit in Saskatchewan and protected fruit in British Columbia at one and the same time, and doing it with the excuse that the forces of progress must unite. Evidently, according to the logic of a such a claim, progress means protection in one community and free trade in another, according to their chance of getting votes."

At the evening meeting returned soldiers submitted a number of questions, all of which Mr. Meighen answered promptly and satisfactorily, and when, by an array of facts and figures he showed conclusively that Canadian pensions and gratuities were the highest provided by any of the belligerent nations, and that Canada's soldier land settlement policy was the largest and most successful in the world, he turned what might have been a hostile demonstration into rounds of applause.

A CIVIC WELCOME.

The premier and Hon. Mr. Calder were given an enthusiastic reception upon their arrival here. A large number of citizens met the premier's party at the depot and Mayor Gale presented Mr. Meighen with an illuminated address.

A deputation, representing the Board

of Trade, waited on the premier shortly after his arrival and urged upon Mr. Meighen the necessity of eliminating the present delay in the dispatch of mail to the Orient. The appointment of a Canadian customs officer at New York was also asked for.

Mr. Meighen promised consideration of both requests. To-morrow the premier and his party go to Victoria, where they will address two large meetings, and on Tuesday they invade Yale Caribou, where a Government supporter is being opposed by Colonel Edgett, a farmer-soldier candidate. The prime minister will address five meetings in the constituency, and Government supporters here claim that their candidate will carry the seat by a substantial majority.

AT NEW WESTMINSTER.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., Oct. 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Before an audience which packed the opera house here this afternoon, Premier Arthur Meighen and J. A. Calder delivered brief addresses describing their party's attitude on various questions of public interest. En route to New Westminster the party stopped at Burnaby, where Reeve Sanderson presented an address of welcome to the premier and a similar presentation was made at New Westminster by Mayor Johnston, on behalf of New Westminster and surrounding municipalities.

Discussing the tariff to the audience here, Premier Meighen said he thought the best plan would be to pursue a course of moderation; find a common middle ground between the two extremes of high protection and free trade. The leader of the Opposition had not stated how he would frame a tariff policy, he asserted.

MR. KING KNOWS.

The cry frequently raised that the administration favored the "big interests" was without foundation, he said. Had the nationalization of 20,000 miles of high protection and free trade been in the interests of big business?

"Hon. Mackenzie King," he said, "knows that we took action in defiance of the wishes of big business interests."

Hon. J. A. Calder said that Canada had a bigger job after the armistice than before the war and were the Government to have gone to pieces, as some persons had suggested, it would have been a criminal act. There were grave problems to be solved. While mistakes had been made no belligerent country in the world had done the work Canada had done.

Party patronage, said Mr. Calder, was practically a thing of the past in Canada.

REFINERS ANNOUNCE ANOTHER SUGAR CUT

Eastern Firms Quote \$15.63 Delivered at Toronto, and Dominion Company \$14.93

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—New cuts in sugar prices were announced to-day by the Canadian refiners, bringing the Eastern refiners' wholesale price down 1.40c per pound to \$15.63 net, delivered in Toronto.

Almost simultaneous with this reduction the Dominion Sugar Company broke away for a further under-selling dash and announced a new price of \$15.71 to the retail trade, of \$14.93 to the wholesale trade.

OUTBREAK NOT SERIOUS

Hog Cholera Situation in Wentworth Is Under Control

HAMILTON, Oct. 29.—The outbreak of hog cholera in Wentworth County is not so serious as first reports indicated, and to-night it was stated that the federal inspectors of the veterinary-general's department had the situation well under control. No hogs were destroyed to-day, but many were given serum treatment as a precautionary measure.

With the exception of the pens quarantined the slaughtering and marketing of hogs in all other parts of Wentworth County will go on as usual.

TORONTO GREETSS GENERAL BOOTH

Head of Salvation Army Welcomed by Hundreds

STILL ONE OF WORKERS

He Tells Audience at Temple. Big Program To-Day

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Gen. Bramwell Booth, head of the Salvation Army, arrived here from Montreal this evening and was officially welcomed at the Union station by Commissioner Richards, head of the Salvation Army work in Eastern Canada, and unofficially by hundreds of cheering members of the army and other citizens.

The general's first address in this city was given before a large assemblage of young people to-night in the Salvation Army Temple. He pointed out that while his executive duties occupied a good deal of his time he still was one of the workers. Although advanced in years, the general assured the gathering that he felt as young as any of them. He urged the young people to be ready to perform the great tasks that would confront them in the coming years. He predicted a wonderful future for the Salvation Army.

Saturday afternoon there will be a big parade of Salvation Army people from the Parliament buildings, Queen's Park, to the city hall steps, where the mayor and others will formally welcome Gen. Booth to the city. The general will address meetings in Massey Hall on Sunday afternoon and night, and Monday night.
